SUMMERSIDE SEED FAIR (Continued from page one) Prince County Seed Fair was held in the Market Hall today while the fair was in session. Dr. Gauthier presided and called upon Mr. Robertson, Sup't of the Nova Scotia Experimental Farm for a few remarks. Mr. Robertson knows how to talk to his audience with a good story well told. He said that the prosperity of P. E. Island would depend on the success of its agricultural life. For a successful agricultural life the farmer needs to know how to produce abundant crops cheaply and how to market them to the best advantage. He said the most impressive thing he had witnessed for a long time was the way in which the rank and file of the farmer who attended the short course in Charlottetown and sang the grand old hymns of the church in the Y. M. G. A. meetings held in Charlottetown on the Sunnyside while the short course was in session. While P. E. Island had farmers who sing the old hymns thus it is safe to say. Dr. Gauthier introduced the next speaker Mr. Campbell, Sup't. of Education for P. E. I. and spoke of him as a man who appreciated his position and who was earnest in his work. It is the work of Mr. Campbell to guide the development of men and women. The superintendent was at the educational meeting last year. He was then new to his office and spoke as a man feeling his way. Tonight he spoke as one who had found his part and gripped it with a master hand. An interesting discussion followed participated in by Albert Schurman of Central Bedoune, Donald Matheson of Whitton, Rev. R. O. Morse and Rev. H. J. Fraser, Summerside, and Inspector Boulter. Many instructive and practical matters were dealt with.

TAFT GIVES ROSTRON CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL

WASHINGTON, March 1.—Captain A. H. Rostron, who, in command of the steamer Carpathia saved 700 Titanic survivors, today was presented by President Taft with the congressional medal of honor for his act. Congress appropriated \$1,000 for the medal. After the ceremony Captain Rostron went to the British embassy, where American and British officials decorated him with the American cross of honor.

ALWAYS CONSULT THE PHONE DIRECTORY.

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders to insert news matter of an advertising nature. Most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the material will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as ordinary subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or in the Evening Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same, all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order for advertising of churches & charities for regular business. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, the paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items are charged for. Even items which are actual money making nature, even though they are somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notices of a concert, lecture, pie social, picnic, etc., are chargeable if there is an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or other food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even though a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Vermin accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either Morning Daily or Evening Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news.

The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided.

LONDON, March 1.—The Turkish government has definitely abandoned its prohibitive stipulations in connection with the bringing about of a cessation of hostilities and has placed the hands of the European powers with a request to conclude peace as advantageously as possible for Turkish interests. Unless, as so often has been the case hitherto, Turkey again changes her mind before the negotiations can be brought to fruition it is the opinion of official quarters here that the direct peace negotiations will be resumed speedily with every prospect of an early settlement and a cessation of the war in which the five Balkan nations are engaged.

PARIS, Mar. 4 (Special)—The memory and attainments of the late Wilbur Wright, the American aviator, were honored today by speeches delivered by many distinguished Frenchmen at a luncheon at which Myron T. Herrick, United States Ambassador to France, had as his guests the committee of Frenchmen in charge of the arrangements for the erection of a memorial to the aeroplane inventor on the Plain of Auvours, near Le Mans, where he made some of his first public flights. Mr. Herrick read a cable despatch from the United States Secretary of State, Philander C. Knox. Mr. Herrick referred to the scientific achievements of Benjamin Franklin, Robert Fulton and Samuel Morse while they were living in France. Admiral Pierre Baudin, Minister of Marine, and Baron d'Estournelles de Constant, as well as the chairman of the French committee, also spoke.
