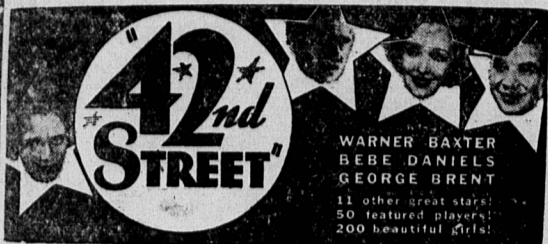

On March 14th, 1933, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Walker, Charlottetown, there passed peacefully to her Eternal Reward, Mrs. Mary Ann Trainor, at the ripe age of 82 years.

Born at Cavendish, the daughter of William and Margaret McLaure, she married Patrick Trainor of Donagh in the year 1873, who predeceased her, also three children.

The remains, followed by a large concourse of people were forwarded on Wednesday to her old home at Donagh, where, despite the inclemency of the weather, many gathered from the surrounding parts to pay a last tribute of respect to one who was ever ready to assist in homes of trouble and sickness.

The following morning her funeral was held at St. Patrick's Church, Port Augustus where a solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Croken, after which her remains were tenderly laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery.

DR. A. McLEAN

A long life of devoted service in his chosen profession was brought to a close on Sunday, March 19th, when the spirit of Dr. A. McLean returned to Him who gave it.

The three months of suffering preceding his death—the first illness or break in the active, strenuous life of a country practitioner—was borne with courage and patience characteristic of him under all circumstances and closed the last chapter in the life of a conscientious, faithful physician, who during fifty years of continuous practice throughout Eastern King's County endeared himself to all with whom he came in contact; not only through his medical ability and art of healing, but also as the cheery, comforting friend.

He will be missed—the familiar figure has gone from our midst—and the numbers from far and near who gathered to pay their last tribute of respect, with bowed heads and saddened hearts, bear silent testimony to the esteem in which he was held.

Dr. MacLean in his 74th year was mentally alert as ever, attentive to calls for ministering to the sick in Town and country.

He was a man of sterling qualities, splendid character and a skilled physician.

Born in Belfast, May 15, 1858, he received his education in the district schools of Queen's County, later attending Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, where he graduated in 1878.

He entered the Medical Department of the University of Pennsylvania at Philadelphia, graduating in 1882.

Railways Reduce Wheat Charges

MONTREAL, March 26—(C.P.)—In order to meet competition at Buffalo and Atlantic seaboard ports the Canadian Railways have decided to drop their rate between Georgian Bay ports and Montreal from 8.60 cts a bushel of wheat to four and a half cents a bushel, it was learned here today.

The new rate will go into effect on April 15 provided the bay elevators absorb a quarter of a cent of the present bay elevation charges.

Absorption by the Georgian Bay elevators of a quarter of a cent per bushel in elevation charges would reduce the charge from three quarters to half a cent a bushel.

Grain men are expecting a reduction in the rate between Buffalo and the Atlantic seaboard from 9.10 cents a bushel of wheat to four and a half cents with elevators absorbing half a cent of the elevation charges.

Speculation on Fate of French Flyers

MARSEILLES, France, March 26.—(A.P.)—The newspaper Petit Marseillais said Saturday that two woodcutters in a lonely section of St. Pierre-Miquelon, off the coast of Newfoundland, about a month ago had found two skeletons and the remains of a plane which had been destroyed by fire.

The newspaper, carefully qualifying its report, said there was a belief the skeletons might be those of Captain Charles Nungesser and Captain Francois Coll, French aviators who were lost on an attempted Paris-to-New York flight in May, 1927.

The information, the newspaper continued, had been communicated to the Air Ministry about a month ago, and the matter had been referred to the Colonial Ministry. No verification of the reported discovery had yet been obtained, the Petit Marseillais said.

Local authorities at St. Pierre have been asked by the Colonial Ministry to check the reports. Among the many reports that traces had been found of the noted flyers was one late September 23, 1932, which said that skeletons found near Curling, Newfoundland, might be those of the men. The report was described as untrue by Police Sergeant Lee of Curling.

PARIS, March 26.—(A.P.)—The newspaper Petit Journal quoted the Air Minister as confirming reports of the finding of two skeletons and the wreckage of an aeroplane in St. Pierre-Miquelon.

The Minister doubted, however, the newspaper said, that the skeletons were those of Charles Nungesser and Francois Coll, noted French aviators, lost in 1927 on an attempted flight from France to the United States.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., March 26—Neither Government departments in Newfoundland, nor authorities in St. Pierre had learned anything today about reports that a couple of woodsmen had found the wreckage of an aeroplane and two skeletons believed to be the remains of Charles Nungesser and Francois Coll. "No reports here," St. Pierre replied to queries sent after it became known that the "Petit Marseillais," a Marseilles newspaper, had published a story to the effect that the skeletons had been found about a month ago.

Nungesser and Coll set out on their ill-fated attempt to cross the Atlantic westward in 1927. The belief that they had actually succeeded in the crossing, but crashed after making a landfall on this side gained some credence at the time, but no shadow of evidence to prove it has ever been adduced.

Sir Alexander MacDonald Dies At His Home

RUDSTON, Yorkshire, March 26 (Canadian Press Cable)—Sir Alexander MacDonald, holder of the title Baron MacDonald of the Isles and the Premier Baronetcy of Nova Scotia, died in his sleep today at his home, Thorpe Hall, in this Yorkshire east riding town. He was 67 years old.

Sir Alexander held several county offices during his life and was noted as a keen musician. At various times he was high sheriff of Yorkshire and conductor of the Biddlington Musical Society and organist and choir-master of the Rudston church.

A special meeting of the Board to ratify the Executive's action has been called for April 17. It is anticipated construction will start early in May.
