SASKATOON, Sask., Oct. 17.—Lack of government finances is the main drawback in state medicine proposals, but within the next ten years tremendous change in the practice of medicine will be made, declared Dean W. S. Lindsay of the University of Saskatchewan medical school in an address here.

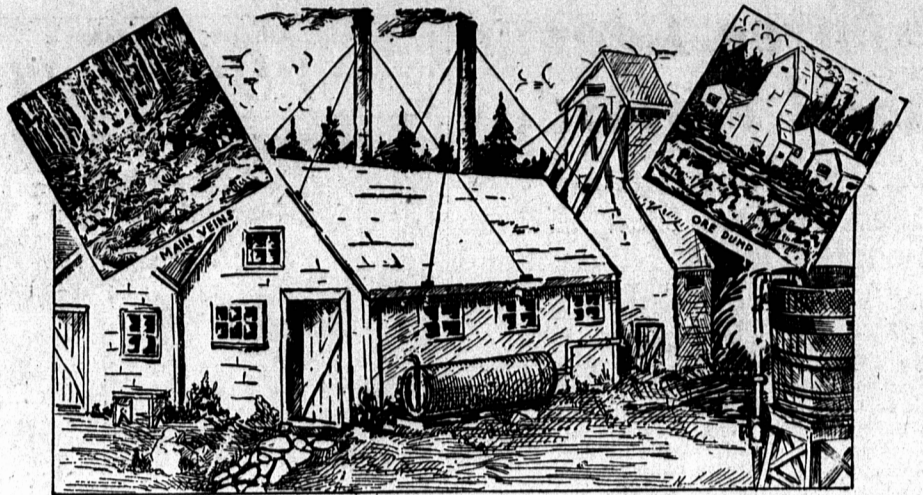
Successful forms of the government system already in operation are free clinics for cancer and venereal diseases, as well as institutions for the treatment of tuberculosis, said Dr. Lindsay, and with state control taking a major part in medical research standards will be raised to new levels.
