THE TROUBLE IN EUROPE.

While the general situation in Europe is still unsettled the atmosphere has cleared quite perceptibly during the past few days. The atmospheric clearing, however, is due to the fact that the Powers show no more disposition to fly at each other's throats than they did a week ago.

Constantinople still stands but the allied forces are without the gates. The Turkish Government admits defeat and has formally asked for the mediation of the Powers. The Powers have presented Turkey's request and secured a promise that it would be considered by the allied Balkan nations, and there the matter rests.

Meanwhile fierce fighting is going on around Adrianople. The troops of both armies are suffering all the horrors of war, severe winter weather, starvation among the Turks, cholera and the soldiers. Victors and vanquished are drinking the cup of war to the very dregs.

As to the prospects of a settlement, and of peace there is still a wide gap to cover. The victorious Bulgarian army is on the point of entering Constantinople and that city is threatened with massacre from within.

PROHIBITION.

There are people everywhere who persist in declaring that Prohibition does not prohibit. Usually they are those who are anxious that it should not. Any one who compares conditions in this province to-day with those of the days of open bar-rooms will find ample proof that, whether as the result of the Prohibition Act or of other causes, there has been a marked decrease in drinking and drunkenness.

Prohibition, although not perfect, does prohibit although imperfectly. It is having its effect and lovers of law and order, those who recognize the sinfulness and wastefulness of drinking should be more optimistic with regard to the future.

of the situation is the fact that moderating influences are being brought to bear by Germany, the close ally of Austria-Hungary, and by Bulgaria, the comrade in arms of Serbia. Both of these nations are exerting themselves to avoid a conflict.

Serbia's friend, Russia, has also been preparing for eventualities. At Sebastopol transports have been prepared to convey troops across the Black Sea and her arsenals and commissariat have been working night and day.

The reply of King Nicholas of Montenegro to the Austro-Hungary Minister, and also to the Italian Minister, as given in our despatches yesterday, was the reply of a man standing behind a gun.

And so the situation stands up to the present. In England and on the continent, although there is a more hopeful feeling than existed a week ago, there is still a good deal of uncertainty and no attempt to disguise the thought, that Europe is facing one of the most critical weeks in her history, for the next week will in all probability end the suspense one way or the other.

He was a member of the Lunenburg fire department from its inauguration, and at the time of his death was a retired captain. He will be buried on Sunday afternoon.
