GERTRUDE COGHLAN
Who Spent the Summer at Souris a Victim of

PTOMAINÉ POISONING.
Ate False Watercresses at her House in New Rochell and Was Taken Ill.

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—Gertrude Coghlan was unable to attend rehearsals of "Vanity Fair" yesterday, owing to the fact that she is at her aunt's house in New Rochell suffering from a severe case of ptomaine poisoning.

Miss Coghlan, after the rehearsal at the Berkeley Lyceum on Saturday, went to the home of her aunt, Rose Coghlan, in New Rochelle, to spend Sunday evening and the bill of fare contained, among other things intended for real healthy appetites, such edibles as oysters and lobsters and watercress. Miss Coghlan is particularly fond of watercress, and she was the only one around the hospitable board who ate much of this dish.

When she became violently ill during the night and a physician was called it was easy to trace her illness to ptomaine poisoning, and to lay the blame for it to the alleged watercress. Some of the weedy growth which remained in the kitchen was examined and the physician saw at once that it was what was known as "false watercress," a plant which has been known to cause death. "False watercress" bears about the same relation to real watercress that a toadstool does to a mushroom.

Miss Coghlan's life was probably saved by the prompt action of her aunt and the physician. She was still too ill to appear for rehearsal yesterday, but Manager James Delcher, who went to New Rochelle yesterday to see his "Becky Sharp" star, said she was getting along nicely and would probably be able to appear at rehearsal this afternoon.

ANOTHER BOXER "GONE" WRONG,

NEW YORK, September 11.—"Kid" McCoy and his wife have both filed petition for divorce. She has named more than one co-respondent, and late last night her counsel said, if the matter was not settled out of court, the lady might tell a really sensational story.

This threatened revelation was supposed to have reference to the recent McCoy-Corbett fight, and the inference is that Mrs. McCoy can, if she must, quite out-do Mrs. Corbett in throwing the anvil upon that now famous battle.

WIRELESS TELEPHONE PLAN.
British Engineer Says it is Possible to Talk to Ships Eight or Ten Miles

BRADFORD, England Sept. 10.—At the session of the physical science section of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, now in annual session here, Sir Henry William Preece, consulting engineer to the British postoffice, made the interesting announcement that as result of his experiments with wireless telegraphy he had found it quite possible to convey audible speech six to eight miles across the sea without wires. He added that it was a practical commercial system and might be extended to communication between ships and the shore.

WILL DEMAND DIVORCE.
Mrs. Corbett Formally Brings Suit Against Her Husband.

NEW YORK Sept. 11.—Mrs. James J. Corbett formally notified Howe & Hummel yesterday to bring suit against "Gentleman Jim" for separation with alimony. When Mr. Corbett departed suddenly for Europe Mrs. Corbett declared that she would sue for a separation but later denied any such intention. Many of her friends were much surprised that she carried out her original threat.

Mrs. Corbett has now stopped talking for publication. At first she couldn't talk enough about Mr. Corbett's cruelty to her and his fake fight with McCoy.

AFRICANS IN PARIS SUFFERING.
Climatic Conditions Too Severe for the Natives of the Dark Continent.

PARIS, Sept. 8.—The last part of August was unusually cold, and so far September has been still more unseasonable. As a consequence the African tribes are suffering greatly, which, combined with homesickness, makes the semi-savages rebellious and also intensely disagreeable toward visitors. Ugly rows are daily affairs in the Dahomey, Madagascar, and Tonkin villages.

At the last World's Sunday School Convention held in London, England, there was exhibited, side by side, 350 Bibles, on one shelf, no two of the same language. There is no other book in the world that has been printed in so many different languages, or in so many sizes or shapes as the Bible. More copies are sold annually than five of the most popular novels combined. This condition has been largely brought about by the great advance in Sunday-school work which has been fostered by the International Sunday-school Convention. Mr. Marion Lawrence, Toledo, Ohio, is the General Secretary, and will send circulars describing the work to those who wish to learn more about it.

DR. PARKER TO QUIT PULPIT.
Famous Congregational Preacher of the London City Temple to Retire.

LONDON, Sept. 10.—Dr. Parker, the famous Congregationalist preacher of the London City Temple, has announced his intention of retiring next year. Dr. Parker is 70 years old and he has been inconceivable since the death of his third wife last year. During the last thirty years American visitors in London have always made it a point to hear Dr. Parker preach.

JOUBERT A COUSIN OF QUEEN.

The late keeper of the archives at Harriem has been discussing the question of the antecedents of the Boer General Joubert, and among other remarks (says an Empress correspondent) makes the following curious statement:—"Through the marriage of one of Joubert's forefathers, a Joubert, with a certain Desmier, Piet Joubert, the general, was really entitled to call Queen Victoria "cousin." Strange as it may appear to some, the maker of this statement is quite prepared to demonstrate the truth of what he says by documentary evidence. He gives the genealogy of the Joubert family, stating that it comes from Eoitou (France) and that the Boer general is a descendant in a direct line from the Knight Joubert, Grand Master of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem in 1160, and that a great-great-grandson of the said knight was killed by the English in 1356 in the battle of Poitiers.

NELSON'S SEVENTEENTH VICTORY.
Chicago Rider Defeats Walthour at New Bedford.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Sept. 8.—John A. Nelson captured his seventeenth win in twenty starts today when he defeated Robert Walthour in their twenty-mile paced race. Walthour's pace cut up badly. The time was 33:47.

Judge Stone on the Hedstrom paced Walthour's today. Ruel and Kent and Blanchard and Hoyt paced Nelson. It was the first meeting of Nelson and Walthour, although they met for five miles while Nelson was an amateur. The little Swede beat the Southern champion there by a half mile.

It was different today. Nelson went away in the lead. Walthour tacked on and followed close. Walthour's motor cut up in the second mile. Nelson rode the first mile in 1:45 3-5 and the second in 1:33, lapping Walthour in the third and again in the fourth.

ALONE IN HOUR OF DEATH.
Found Lying on Floor Choked by a Piece of Meat.

FREDERICTON, Sept. 12.—Miss Charlotte Moore, a maiden lady who lived alone at Eel River and sister of Frederick Moore, the well known millman, was found dead at her home on Wednesday of this week by Mrs. George Olts, a neighbor who was in the habit of visiting the house once a day. The poor woman was discovered lying on the floor near the dining room table, and from appearances it was evident that she had choked to death by a piece of meat becoming lodged in her throat. The sad affair has cast a gloom over the community.

LAST AND FATAL HEAT.
Champion Miller Tangled in a Disastrous Spill.

NEW HAVEN, September 11.—As the result of a spill at the Coliseum board track to-night Miller, the six days' champion of the world it is feared sustained concussion of the brain and Archie McEachern of Canada was also badly injured. The pace maker tandems were all more or less injured. Miller and McEachern were riding in the six days' race (one hour a night) and coming into the last lap of the 32nd mile the McEachern tandem sustained a puncture and the swift Canadian rider ran full tilt into his pace makers.
