CHANGE OF COURSE FOR NRA FORECAST

Change From Price Fixing And Production Control to Competitive System Seen.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4.—Uncovering a probable change of course for NRA, Donald R. Richberg, recovery coordinator, advised business today to leave the "lopsided guild socialism" of price fixing and production control in favor of "the old competitive system."

Morning Sederunt

The synod's Home Mission report was presented by Rev. W. M. Thompson, D.D. The report from Cape Breton was given by Rev. Quincy McDowell.

Progress was reported in that field. There were five students in all the mission fields, and all but one have been paid in full.

Another matter for encouragement was the number who came out and took their stand for the Master. The appointment of Rev. J. A. Guergis in River Denis, and Rev. A. D. Hamilton at Grand Falls was referred to. The greatest need of the field is more elders. The field is ripe for the harvest and what is needed is revival.

In the absence of Rev. O. Ritchie Bell, Rev. A. J. R. Sinclair, reported on behalf of the Halifax Presbytery. Rev. Dr. W. M. Townsend reported for the St. John Presbytery.

Afternoon Sederunt

At the afternoon session of the Maritime Synod, Mr. C. M. Archibald, Halifax, reported on Synod funds which were stated to be in a satisfactory condition. The Rev. Dr. Kerr invited the synod to meet next year in St. David's Church, Lunenburg.

Import Duties Are Relaxed

The Department of National Revenue announced today the fixed value for duty purposes imposed on lettuce has been cancelled insofar as it applies to points in Ontario and east of that province. Similarly the fixed value for duty on plums and prunes has been cancelled insofar as it applies to points in Manitoba and further west.

Strikers Storm Troop Barracks; Many Arrested

Fear Numerous Casualties In Revolutionary Outbreak. Cabinet Faces Crisis As Strike Is Called.

MADRID, Oct. 4.—Strikers opposed to the new Spanish government tonight stormed the Montana Savoie barracks, engaging in their first clash with soldiers of the Republic. Preliminary reports stated many were injured.

The fight with the troops followed the killing of an assault guard whose detachment exchanged shots with disorderly demonstrators in the Prosperidad district. Two strikers were wounded in this encounter.

In the clash at Prosperidad, on the outskirts of the city, strikers barricaded themselves in a house. Guards approaching the house were met by a rain of bullets. A detachment of guards, firing from a distance, then sprayed the house with shots while a small detachment rushed the building.

Sixty-three persons were arrested, and it was found that 50 of them were armed. A general strike was called by radical elements as a protest against the Centrist and Rightist government of Premier Alejandro Lerroux. The Premier and his new ministers indicated they were taking a firm stand, and in quarters close to the cabinet it was reported a decree of martial law has been drawn up and is ready for promulgation.

While Madrid was tense with the expectation of revolutionary outbreaks, disquieting reports were received tonight from Barcelona, capital of autonomous Catalonia. These reports stated the generalitat of Catalonia had issued orders that military forces in the region were to obey only the commands of generalitat officials.

Just before the strike was called the new Premier, in an eloquent speech accepting the office from the hands of former Premier Ricardo Samper Ibanez, whose government was forced out of office Monday, said: "I will permit no one, absolutely no one, to prejudice the interests of the republic by acts disrupting the public peace."

Simultaneously, the executive committee of the left Republican party, most powerful of the political groups opposing Lerroux, declared formally that "the handing over of the republic to its enemies is a monstrous deed which forces us to sever all relationships with everyone connected with the regime."

The party announced it would "recourse to every means available in the defence of the republic."

Subscriptions To Refunding Loan Pass Half Way Mark

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—The half-way mark had been passed with a preliminary total of \$128,750,000 in subscriptions to the new \$250,000,000 Dominion Refunding Loan, Minister of Finance E. N. Rhodes announced tonight. The issue went on the market Monday morning.

Assistant receivers-general offices outside of Montreal and Toronto were beginning to show up much better, stated the Minister. This was particularly the case in the west where a substantial increase in the number of cash applications was recorded today.

Special gratification at the increase in conversion subscriptions, which were more than double the volume received yesterday, was expressed by the Minister. This may have been due in part to the special appeal to convert victory bonds issued earlier today, but probably also was indicative of the momentum which the campaign was acquiring, he said. Saturday is the last day upon which exchanges of bonds may be made and the bonuses secured. After Saturday bonds can only be turned in for conversion at par.

He desired particularly that small holders throughout the country should take note of the limited period during which the conversion offer is open, stated Mr. Rhodes. Invariably in these refunding issues there were many holders who failed to avail themselves of the conversion privilege, and were disappointed when they found the department had no option but to return their principal at maturity, he added.

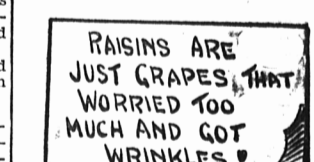
INSULL RECORDS ARE STUDIED

(By Robert M. Yoder, Associated Press Staff Writer) CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—From the books and records of some 75 corporations, the U. S. Government today began assembling proof in support of its claim that Samuel Insull's "Corporation Securities Company of Chicago" was only a weapon with which to take \$100,000,000 from investors.

First witnesses were the office managers of New York and Chicago brokerage houses, the first of 75 or more who will be asked to identify records in the case. Defense attorneys questioned them at such length that only five could be heard, indicating that it may take a week to cover this preliminary testimony.

From the records, once they are identified, the prosecutors will attempt to show deals by which Insull and the others pushed their stocks up to enhance the customers' appetite.

Earlier in the first day of Insull's trial for mail fraud, the erstwhile utility overlord and 16 business associates, sitting like a school class beneath Judge James H. Wilkerson's bench, heard charges which left little standing of Insull's reputation as a financier.
