JUDGMENT GIVEN FOR DEFENDANT—The case of Ramsay against Milligan was concluded at the Supreme Court at Summerside Saturday before Mr. Justice Gaudet. The jury returned a verdict for the defendant.—S.

PLANE RETURNS—The plane piloted by Mr. Jenkins and piloted by Mr. Junior Jones, returned yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock from Montreal. Mr. Jones left Montreal at 8 A.
