VITAL STATISTICS REPORT FOR CITY—Births in the City during the month of July were 33 more than the previous month, it was disclosed by Dr. B. C. Keeping at the Council Meeting Monday night. The same month saw 18 people die and 18 were married in Charlottetown. The attached report of the Sanitary Officer reveals that there was "nothing what-ever" in the complaint that carcases of dogs were not being buried at the dump of the Hygienic Service Company. The place had been visited and a thorough investigation made.

46 ARRESTS IN JULY—A total of 46 arrests were made in the City during the month of July. It was revealed by Chief A. Birnie yesterday in his monthly report. The complete in his list with 32 being drunk led to the "cooler" for this offence. In addition to these arrests there were two convictions under the Prohibition Act for the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor. Five juveniles were dealt with in the Juvenile Court. Only 23 offenders were tagged for contraventions of the traffic regulations as compared with 107 the previous month. Prohibition Act fines amounted to \$45, as compared with \$280 in June. Miscellaneous fines brought in a total of \$277, as compared with \$198, for June.
