Launching Hollywood's newest find in British boy actors, Ronald Sinclair, in "Thoroughbreds Don't Cry," new drama of childhood loyalties played against the panorama of American racing, provides entertainment in a new form at the Capitol Theatre.

Sons of Temperance Urge Restoration of Prohibition Commission

GRAND DIVISION RECORDS DISSATISFACTION WITH PRESENT ENFORCEMENT BY ATTORNEY-GENERAL.

The annual meeting of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance was held in the public hall, Fredericton, on Friday, November 4th. There were two business sessions, morning and afternoon with a public meeting in the evening. Quite a goodly number of members and visitors were in attendance.

A number of the Grand Division officers were unable to be present. After their places had been filled by other members the Grand Division opened at 11 a.m. with the following state of officers on duty:

Grand Worthy Patriarch, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert; Grand Worthy Associate, Mrs. David Brooks; Grand Scribe, R. B. MacCaul; Grand Conductor, B. L. Coombs; Grand Chaplain, Rev. A. F. Baker; Grand Treasurer, John N. Profit; Grand Sentinel, Miss Jean White; Past G. W. P., Rev. A. F. Baker.

At the morning session the different sessional committees were appointed and the reports of the several officers were submitted to the meeting and passed on to the respective committees appointed to deal with them.

Just after the opening of the afternoon session Mr. S. D. Jarvis of Tansley Ontario, the Most Worthy Patriarch of the National Division of the Sons of Temperance of North America who had arrived during the morning session was officially received and later on addressed the meeting.

The greater part of the remainder of the afternoon session was taken up with the discussion of the reports of the several sessional committees. Quite a number of practical suggestions for the better carrying on of the work of the Order were adopted and will no doubt be acted upon in future.

The following are some of the practical suggestions adopted:

1. Committees of three at selected centres for promotion of temperance program.
2. Visitation of Public Schools.
3. Stress study and exam. of autumn course provided by W. C. T. U. and Religious Education Council of Canada.
4. Assist police with information.
5. Annual conference with civic authorities and police officials.
6. Request government to arrange for campaign of temperance education using outstanding Catholic and Protestant speakers on common platform.
7. Take a personal interest in persons who drink.
8. That government be asked to furnish information to the Prohibition Commission Needed.

The meeting went on record as favoring the independent Prohibition Commission instead of the prohibition enforcement being left with Attorney-General's department as it is now handled. A committee of three was appointed to present this matter at the annual meeting of the Temperance Federation. Also that the Temperance Federation have some say regarding the appointment of this Commission.

The following slate of officers for the ensuing year were then elected and later installed by the Most Worthy Patriarch, Rev. R. Hensley Stavert; G. W. Associate, Mrs. David Brooks; G. Scribe, R. B. MacCaul; G. Chaplain, R. Hensley Stavert; G. Conductor, B. L. Coombs; G. Treasurer, John N. Profit; G. Sentinel, Heber MacLean; G. Supt. of Young Peoples Work, Miss Jean White; P. G. W. Patriarch, Rev. A. F. Baker.

At the public meeting in the evening the following program was well carried out: Opening chorus, marks by Chairman, Rev. R. H. Stavert; duet, J. J. Mackay and Miss Edna Scenbaugh; Instrumental music, Mrs. Harold Sharp and Harry Craswell; address by Mr. S. D. Jarvis; address D. N. MacKay M. L. A.; solo, Miss Jean White; address, B. L. Coombs; chorus, "College Boy's Song"; Refuge Division; address, Leslie Weeks; reading of resolution and address, Rev. R. H. Stavert; National Anthem.

Report of Committee on State of the Order:

1. Your committee recognizes the difficulty with which such work as that sponsored by the Sons of Temperance is carried on today. The very great changes in social life in general make practically impossible the organization of divisions as in years gone by.
2. The many other youth organizations occupying the field of youth activity makes it very difficult to secure the time and the loyalty of our young people for purely temperance work. And while it is often said that other youth organizations can carry on the work formerly done by the Sons of Temperance and other similar societies, it must be said that until other organizations put into their work a total abstinence pledge they cannot nor never will carry on a work the value of which approximates ours in the field of temperance.

Resolutions

1. That we as a Grand Division extend our hearty thanks to the residents of Fredericton for their kindness and generosity in entertaining our members and visitors so royally since coming into their community.
2. That we as a Grand Division take this opportunity of expressing to our Most Worthy Patriarch Mr. S. D. Jarvis, our appreciation of his kindly visit and his inspiring addresses. We shall look forward with pleasure to his coming again whenever opportunity offers.
3. That we continue to urge upon all our members the great need of doing more work among the young by way of organizing Bands of Hope wherever possible.
4. That believing that nothing has a more restraining and in the end a more beneficial effect than exposure, upon those who are breaking our prohibition law, we wish to take this opportunity of commending our newspapers for having of late published the names
