MADAME X THE DRAMA OF MOTHER LOVE

"Madame X," perhaps the stage's greatest drama of mother love and, incidentally, credited with being the first "courtroom drama" in history, has come to the talking screen as the Prince Edward, a rejuvenated and certainly much more interesting drama than in its older form.

It is, literally, a blend between the style of the silent drama and the kaleidoscopic changes of locale. The dialogue, too, is different—shortened and concentrated to match the action. It is in effect a concentrated essence of drama.

Ruth Chatterton, as the ill-fated heroine, is superb. Rising to the heights of dramatic emotion and the depths of despair by turn, she gives a performance that is literally a revelation as to what can be done by an artist with this new medium of the screen.

The cast is a perfect one. Lewis Stone, as the stern husband, and Raymond Hackett, as the son, have the two most important male roles, and young Hackett, in the dramatic courtroom scene, perhaps even surpasses his great role in "The Trial of Mary Dugan."

For the convenience of the sixteen barristers practicing in Prince County and the public, there being no resident Judge nearer than Charlottetown, a distance of one hundred miles from Tignish and forty from Summerside. A request to the Minister of Justice of Canada to enact the necessary legislation to provide that it be compulsory that a Judge of the Supreme Court shall have residence and Chambers in Summerside. That Premier Lea be requested to provide such office for Chambers for a Supreme Court Judge in the Prince County Court House, Summerside. A copy of this resolution be forwarded to Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Minister of Justice at Ottawa and Hon. Walter M. Lea, Premier of P. E. I. The motion was seconded by Councillor Moore and carried. Minor matters pertaining to the laying of the side walks was discussed. In regard to the repairing of the side walks at the extreme east end of the town, the Town Clerk was instructed to get in touch with the local Government in regard to the matter. Coun. Moore read the Police report which was passed. Mention was made in the report of the lateness of the hour that the Chinese restaurants remain open. FINANCE COMMITTEE

Councillor Foster for the Finance Committee reported that the expenditures for the first eight months are exceeding the estimates and he hoped that the chairman of committees would be as economical as possible.

STREET COMMITTEE

Councillor Kennedy for the Street Committee reported that all the permanent street work is completed except Bayfield Street. He did not think that anything could be done relative to the drains running into the Government Pond this year.

TENDERS COMMITTEE

Councillor Dougan stated that he had nothing to report for the Tender Committee. He wondered, however, who appointed the plain clothes men, during the last month. His Worship stated that the men were appointed by the Police Committee and were sworn in by the magistrate.

PUBLIC PROPERTY

Councillor McDougall for the Public Property Committee stated that the scale house presents a much better appearance than before, and that the work is progressing favorably on the breastwork at the park.

SUMMERSIDE Sep 8—The monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council was held in the Council Chambers last night. Mayor Lidstone presiding, with all the council members present. The minutes of previous meeting were read and adopted. Paid bills to the amount of \$958.24 were passed. Unpaid bills \$3339.61 were passed for payment. Electric light paid bills \$663.61, unpaid bills \$1712.01 were passed. Tenders for coal were read, and \$8.50 per ton was accepted for coal to heat the Town Building. Tenders were read from different firms for the installation of furnace for Town Building. Messrs Thomas Johnston's tender of \$435 was accepted. A communication from Mr. Harrington, treasurer officer, for an increase of \$100 in salary was laid over. A communication from Rev. St. Clair Jeans objecting to the violation of the Sunday Observance Act by certain aeroplanes operating on Sunday by taking up passengers for money and disturbing the quiet of the Sabbath-Day was read. The matter was left in the hands of the Police Department. The strict enforcement of the observance of Sunday closing of stores will also be taken up by the Police.

The total attendance amounted to approximately 75,000 persons, this being about 3000 in excess of last year. The motor vehicle traffic was the heaviest experienced in this city. All members of the force performed extra duties daily. There was no congestion of traffic and it is pleasing to note that the week passed without an accident of a serious nature or any person being injured. The Force maintained law and order, also regulated traffic both in the City and at the Fair Grounds. There was a total absence of crime or disorder.

I regret to report that our record of immunity from street accidents of a fatal nature was marred on the evening of August 12th when a child was struck and fatally injured by a motor vehicle operated on Euston Street. An inquest was held and the jury exonerated the driver of the car from blame notwithstanding the fact that the brakes of the car in question were found in a defective condition. On the afternoon of August 15th another child was struck by a passing motor vehicle on Dorchester Street, but on this occasion the injuries to the child were very slight. The child was playing with a small wagon and suddenly ran out in front of a parked vehicle. The operator of the car was in no way to blame, and was travelling at a low rate of speed at the time. We strongly urge parents to caution their children against the practice, far too prevalent, of playing on our streets. Constable C. B. Jay was granted ten days leave of absence, with pay, from August 23rd.

POLICE REPORT

Councillor Holman presented the City Police Report, prepared by Chief Blawie for the month ending Aug. 21 as follows: Eighty arrests were made during August for the following classified offences:

This constitutes the largest record of arrests made in this city during a period of one month. The nearest approach to this was the corresponding month last year when the arrests totalled 78.

In addition to the above mentioned arrests there was one conviction for obstructing a peace officer in the execution of his duty, a fine of \$30 and costs being imposed. There was also one conviction for common assault, five for non-payment of dog tax, and one for disorderly conduct. Thirty-eight cases under the City Traffic By-Law were disposed of, resulting in thirty-one convictions and seven dismissals. Thirty-two of these cases were for operating motor vehicles at a rate of speed greater than is reasonable and proper, the other six cases being for breaches of the "stop regulation. There were two convictions under the Sanitary By-Law.

We assisted the Prohibition Officers in seven searches of premises suspected of the unlawful possession or sale of intoxicating liquors. Six prosecutions were entered resulting in one conviction, three dismissals and two adjournments.

On August 27th the force collected twenty-eight samples of milk and six of cream from licensed milk vendors same being delivered to the City Analysis for test. The two milk vendors whose samples collected in July were found below test appeared before the Stipendiary Magistrate on August 16th, and the Vendor whose sample contained less than 3 percent of butter fat was fined \$10 and costs. The other offender whose sample contained sediment was fined \$3 and costs.
