ST. ANDREW'S DAY FESTIVAL

Homage to Scotland's Patron Saint

The association of all nationalities and patron saints seems to be more or less nebulous. Even England's connection with St. George is of doubtful origin. It is also a matter of legend as to how and when the name of St. Andrew became so familiarly associated with Scotland.

But, in spite of any doubts that are cast on Scotia's claim to its accredited patron saint, Scotsmen in every part of the world, whether in the dreary East, or in the bustling West, or under the Pole Star or Southern Cross, adhere to the traditional custom of honoring the memory of St. Andrew and recalling the story of his martyrdom every 30th November.

Of all the St. Andrew Day gatherings on Monday next the chief will be the 27th anniversary festival in London of the Royal Scottish Corporation, that ancient charity for the relief of distressed Scots in the Metropolis, at which Lord Macmillan will preside.

"The Scottish Box"

The Corporation dates officially from about the time of the Union of the English and Scottish Crowns but it is older under another title. As early as 1613 the "Scottish Box" as it was called, was instituted, and it was elevated to the dignity of a Corporation by Royal Charter by Charles II. in 1686.

Its origin can be traced back to the time when James VI. of Scotland, on becoming James I. of England, was followed south by a cohort of his countrymen, some of whom were prompted by a sense of loyalty and others by a realization of the fact that with the removal of the Court to England a great deal of Scottish trade would be transferred to London. It was for the benefit of those who suffered on this account that the "Scottish Box" was instituted, and into it the more prosperous of James's followers from the North placed such contributions as they could spare for the relief of their kinsmen who were overtaken by misfortune.

According to one historian, Queen Elizabeth had previously "cut down the number of Scotsmen in London to the astonishingly small number of 53, but in James's time and later their numbers had increased so greatly that it was as grimly remarked, "300 poor Scotsmen swept off by the Great Plague of 1665-6 were buried at the expense of the B. X."

For many years the historic receptacle disappeared for some unknown reason, and no traces of it could be found. Eventually it was discovered in a second-hand shop in London. An English man interested in antiquities purchased it, and on learning its history he handed it over to the Scottish Corporation.

Now, at every St. Andrew's Festival dinner, the ancient "Box" is placed in front of the chairman, as a reminder of the origin of the Corporation and as an inspiration to generous giving for the relief of Scottish folks in London who through age and infirmity or other causes have fallen on evil days.

Annual Report Shows Bank Of Montreal In Usual Strong Position

Bank Has Total Assets of \$768,535,908 to Meet Payment of Liabilities to the Public of \$692,218,818, Leaving An Excess of Assets of \$76,317,090 — Liquid Assets of \$492,526,984 Are Equivalent to 71.15% of Liabilities to Public — Earnings For Year Substantially Below Previous Period — At \$4,005,153 Are Equal to 5.32% of Capital, Rest and Undivided Profits.

Readily maintaining its usual strong position, the Bank of Montreal is forwarding to shareholders the annual statement for the fiscal year to October 31st.

The summary of the report, which is issued in an understandable form and appears in this issue, shows the Bank had total assets of \$768,535,908, to meet the payment of total liabilities to the public of \$692,218,818, leaving an excess of assets amounting to \$76,317,090.

While total assets are practically unchanged from a year ago, there has been an increase of over \$50,000,000 in the holdings of high-grade securities and a corresponding decrease in current loans, due to the lessened requirements of the Bank's customers under prevailing trade conditions. As a result of this change, liquid assets are up to \$492,526,984, equivalent to 71.15% of liabilities to the public, as against \$438,768,566 a year ago, equal to 63.46%. Included in liquid assets are cash holdings of \$78,633,217, or 11.36 per cent. of public liabilities.

An interesting feature of the statement is the maintenance of total deposits at the high level of \$841,346,710. These compare with \$648,632,663 a year ago.

Profit and Loss Account

Profits for the year are substantially lower, due to the smaller volume of business offering and the lower rates of interest on securities. On the other hand, distribution to shareholders is well below that of previous years, due to reduction in

dividend rates. After taking care of all distributions, the total credit of profit and loss amounted to \$1,586,461.

As was to be expected, the largest proportion of liquid assets are in government and other bonds and debentures, the total of them being \$318,967,375. The greater portion of these securities mature at early dates. These holdings are up from \$266,726,884 at the end of the previous year.

The call loans in the same way showed a tendency to increase, call loans in Canada being up to \$7,607,109, from \$5,157,600, while those outside of Canada were \$36,964,960, as compared with \$30,071,136 a year ago.

Current Loans Contract

As opposed to this situation, the customers of the Bank have not required as much accommodation as under more normal trade conditions. As a result, current loans are down to \$251,885,262, from \$302,501,263 last year.

Total profits were \$4,005,153, equivalent to 5.32% on the combined capital, rest and undivided profits. They are down from \$4,663,100 a year ago, a decline of approximately \$650,000. Out of the profits there was set aside for dividends to shareholders \$3,040,000, as compared with \$3,960,000; provision for taxes Dominion government \$608,558, and reserve for bank premises \$100,000. After all deductions, an addition of \$336,884 was made to profit and loss account.

Unemployment In U. S. 10,176,000

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—(A.P.)—Unemployment in the United States, calculated by the American Federation of Labor from Government and Union figures, reached 10,176,000 in October—an increase of 11,000 over September which William Green pronounced "exceptionally small for this time of the year."

Despite the large number of jobless and while giving warning that whole-hearted cooperation of the citizenry will be needed to keep the number from growing much larger through the winter, Green today reported a substantial number of favorable factors.

For the three months ended October, 945,748 cwts. of bean shorts, etc., were exported from Canada as against 861,193 cwts. in the corresponding period of last year.

U.S. ACTION MAY AFFECT POTATOMARKET

FREDERICTON, N.B., Nov. 27.—New Brunswick Potato Growers are wondering just now what will be the ultimate effect of the United States currency inflation policy on the price of tubers grown on this side of the international boundary. The situation at the present time does not look encouraging, but in the event that demand in Canada increases during the coming winter to the extent indicated earlier this season by a short crop, conditions prevailing in the U. S. markets may be offset.

Depreciated Dollar

Under the stimulus of a depreciated dollar potato prices in America are jumping. In the last week we saw a barrel, up to \$1.50. During the past fortnight or so, the price has been stationary for the stock in New Brunswick holding around seventy cents below the peak of the season.

The domestic market situation in Canada and the United States are somewhat similar so that the currency move is considered to be chiefly responsible for the marked contrast in prices here and in the States. The United States will take a quantity of New Brunswick certified seed potatoes, but as payment will be in U. S. funds, the Canadian growers and shippers will have to accept a discount on the exchange, which discounts will have further depressing influence here.

British Motto To Buy British

LONDON, Nov. 27.—(C.P.)—With "Buy British" as their motto the railway companies are organizing an exhibition train to tour the country, halting at stations for business men and the public generally to inspect the goods of various exhibiting firms.

Leopold Walford, chairman of the company organizing the train, said it is proposed to reconstruct 17 corridor coaches to house the exhibits of 100 to 150 firms. The first "Buy British" exhibition train will leave Birmingham March 14 and return June 15. There will be more than 80 stopping places, including Wolverhampton, Newport, Cardiff, Bristol, Exeter, Plymouth, Southampton, Brighton, Nottingham, Derby, Manchester, Liverpool, Crewe and Stoke-on-Trent.

Plans are in preparation also for a Continental tour for a British exhibition train beginning in Belgium at the end of March and for the autumn of 1934 a tour of the North of England and Scotland is being worked out. Later it is proposed to arrange for trains to tour the Dominions.

VETERAN LEGISLATURE MEMBER DIES

EDMONTON, Nov. 27.—Robert Telford, 72, member of the first two legislatures of Alberta, is dead at his home at Leduc, where he had lived since 1889. Telford, a former member of the old Royal Northwest Mounted Police, is survived by Mrs. E. J. Smith, Shawville, Que., a sister, and John A. Telford, at Campbell's Cove, N. S., a brother.

FRENCH AMBASSADOR CONFERS WITH HITLER

Francois-Poncet Makes Secret Visit To Berlin In Order To Straighten Out Arms Tangle.

BERLIN, Nov. 28.—(A.P.)—A secret visit of the French Ambassador, Andre Francois-Poncet, to Chancellor Adolf Hitler and his conference, reportedly on Germany's return to disarmament discussions, aroused intense interest today.

It was understood that Hitler, who six weeks ago started the world by withdrawing from the Geneva Disarmament Conference and the League, requested the conversation and that the French Envoy readily accepted the invitation.

Met Friday

The two met Friday and news of the interview leaked out only by accident in governmental circles, much to the chagrin of M. Francois-Poncet who, it was said, wished, like Hitler, that nothing be said about it.

The reason offered for the secrecy was that France was without a government following the defeat of Premier Albert Sarraut's Cabinet on a budgetary measure.

It was assumed in diplomatic quarters that Hitler's request constituted an inauguration of his declared policy of dealing individually with representatives of various powers and that, after successful personal negotiations with the Polish Envoy, the same course will be followed by the Chancellor in his relations with France.

Express Satisfaction

Some observers said it was really the old diplomacy, like the prodigal son, returning home again. Satisfaction, however, was expressed on many sides at what bids fair to be a prelude to a series of personal negotiations on the vexing Franco-German problems.

Much will naturally depend on instructions Francois-Poncet will receive in the course of the next few days from the new government.

For one version of the conference, that the interview had to do with complaints about the Polish Parliament's alleged propaganda campaigns abroad by Germany, there seemed to be no foundation.

Rather, highly placed circles appeared to be of the opinion that this marked the beginning of direct negotiations and was a part of a free exchange of views on disarmament.

Shipments of cattle from Western to Eastern Canada for the first forty-four weeks of 1933 included 74,154 cattle; 31.8 calves; 246,306 hogs; and 44,666 sheep.

Upper Canada Trade Market

The chief hope of the potato trade in this Province at present lies in the disposal of the bulk of New Brunswick surplus in Upper Canada.

Ontario's production of 1933 was below that of a year ago, providing a large opening there than usual for tubers from this part of the country.

Shippers estimate that, while shipping activity has not been great in the last few weeks, the movement of the crop from the Province has been well up to last year's figure or the corresponding period.

Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa and several Ontario centres are furnishing the chief market for New Brunswick tuber stock at the present time.

For the first forty-five weeks of 1933 (November 28) 2,860,786 hogs were graded in Canada as against 2,571,861 in the corresponding period of last year—an increase of 60,786.
