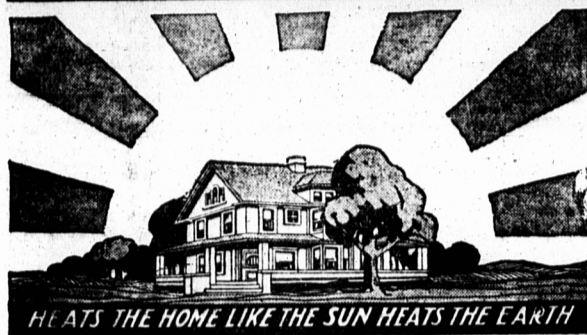

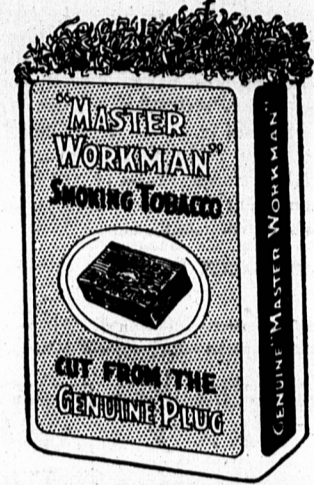
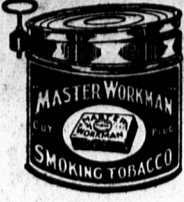

May Conduct Big Race "In Camera"

LONDON, Nov. 24.—The Evening News has discovered the university boat race next year, like a risqué divorce case, may be conducted "in camera." It means by that it will be rowed at an inconvenient hour to the hundreds of thousands of Londoners who make an annual pilgrimage to the Thames to see the University eights.

The date of the race next year is Saturday March 27, and the same time which must be fixed by the tide is half-past twelve o'clock. This means that unless there is a tremendous outbreak of grandmothers' funerals among office employees they cannot see the race.

The News suggested the date might be changed. "It is impossible," said Cambridge, "to row a week earlier because if we do our men will not have been long enough at the university to be allowed to count their term of residence."

ST. JOHN, Nov. 24.—Everything looks well for the Maritime indoor track and field championships which will be staged in the Arena next Friday night under the auspices of the M. P. B. A. U. of C., which is being assisted by all local affiliated clubs.

Queen's University Beats Balmy Beach

TORONTO, Nov. 14.—The star squad wearing the tri-color of Queen's University overcame the third last obstacle in their effort to set a new record by winning four consecutive Canadian senior rugby championships on Saturday afternoon, when for the second year in succession they defeated Balmy Beach, Ontario Rugby football union champions, the score being 21 to 9.

The victory was the twenty-sixth consecutive one for the present title holders since the season of 1922 and Queen's thereby increased their record of straight wins.
