New Position for
Mr. Ross M. Stuntz

Mr. Ross M. Stuntz, who has been on the Island for the past year and a half, in charge of the Henry L. Doherty Company's operations at Governor's Island, will leave this week for Bartlesville, Oklahoma, accompanied by Mrs. Stuntz and their two sons. The news of their departure will be learned with deep regret in this city, where they made many warm friends.

It is not yet known who the successor of Mr. Stuntz will be, but the change will not interfere in any way with the progress of boring, which started on December 1st, 1925, after a great deal of preliminary work had been done.

As has already been stated, the contract for boring was taken over by Mr. Hugh MacKay and Lee MacClung, of the firm of MacKay and MacClung, Sapulpa, Oklahoma.

Operations were suspended about two months ago to await the arrival of materials, including casing and tools, which have since arrived, and are now all on the island. Work will be started as soon as the transportation conditions are considered safe.

Mr. Stuntz on leaving here will take a position with the Empire Gas and Fuel Company, of Bartlesville, as Superintendent in charge of the gas production. The Empire companies are the largest oil and natural gas producing subsidiaries of Henry L. Doherty and Company, and have been producing for a number of years, in one of the richest oil-bearing territories in the United States.

Mr. Stuntz wishes to thank the people of Charlottetown for the many courtesies and kindnesses which he and his family have received at their hands since leaving here. He would bespeak for the continued interest of our people in their undertaking, and in the fact that their efforts will be crowned with success. Mrs. Stuntz and he greatly enjoyed their stay on Prince Edward Island, and regret that circumstances are such that they could not remain longer among a people of whose hospitality they speak in the highest terms.

BRITAIN WILL
RECOGNIZE THE
DIAZ REGIME

Should Such a Course
Be Necessary, De-
clares Brit. Charge
d'Affaires Patterson

CORINTO, Nicaragua, Feb. 28.—"If necessary Great Britain will recognize the Diaz regime" Harold Patterson, British Charge d'Affaires declared today after conferring lengthily with Capt. Lecky, commander of the British cruiser Colombo, which was sent to Nicaraguan waters to give British residents a place of refuge in case of actual peril.

Aboard the Colombo Mr. Patterson added, Captain Lecky has given general instructions from the admiralty. He is not familiar with the situation while I have gone over matters here since October, 1925. Nothing will be done without first conferring with and working in conjunction with Rear Admiral Latimer, commander of U. S. Naval forces in Nicaraguan waters. If necessary Britain will be the first nation to recognize the present government after the U. S. I again wish to thank the United States government for such measures as have been taken to save Nicaragua from anarchy which was very apparent a short time ago."

Capt. Lecky also conferred with Consul John L. Griffith and paid an official call on Admiral Latimer. The British Colony is jubilant over the arrival of the Colombo, and is preparing to entertain the officers and men in case they are given shore leave.

Three Miners Killed

All these were drilling on the 1,400 foot level when the fall of gas struck the charge of dynamite which had been laid during Saturday's blasting in and had failed to explode.

Canada in Favor of
Naval Reduction

OTTAWA, Feb. 28.—Canada is in favor of reduction in naval strength as outlined in the recent proposals of the United States. It was said here today in usually well informed circles. Since the proposals by the President, Calvin Coolidge, the British and various dominion governments have been in consultation with Canada's attitude on the matter was cabled to London a few days ago, it was made known in official circles, but it was desired to keep the nature of the dominions stand on the question secret pending a statement from the British government.

MONTREAL, Feb. 28.—Arthur Hope, of 2207 Wurtels Street, was arrested before Judge Enright today on charges of forging a Dominion Bank of Canada bank note making a \$1 bill resemble a \$1000 bill, of forging United States bank notes by altering \$500 bank notes and having in his possession bank notes of Canada and the United States raised from \$1 to \$100 and \$500. Preliminary inquiry was set for March 8, and no bail was allowed. In all, police claim, 17 one dollar bills, altered to resemble bills worth \$8,100 were found.

Former Premier
Is Elected on
Labor Ticket

SYDNEY, Australia, Feb. 28.—The election of E. G. Theodore, former premier of Queensland and labor candidate in the federal by-election in Daller constituency was conceded today. Mr. Theodore has polled 20,974 votes to the 12,510 received by Gee, the nationalist candidate and as only the absentee votes remain to be counted his election is certain. By-election was made necessary by the resignation of W. G. Mahoney, labor member. It is generally expected that Mr. Theodore will become the leader of the labor party in the federal house, the present leader, Matthew Charlton, resigning on account of ill health.

WOMAN JAILED
AS 'BABY FARM'
OPERATOR

HULL, Que., Feb. 28.—Mrs. Diana Lacroix, elderly woman, residing in a locality known as "stone pipe alley", Wrightville, a suburb of Hull, is detained in the Hull jail as a material witness in connection with the recent deaths under suspicious circumstances of three infants, not her own, at her home. Acting under instruction from the attorney general at Quebec, Dr. Rosario Fontaine, assistant to Dr. Wilfred Derome, Quebec provincial criminal analyst has performed an autopsy upon the bodies of the infants the result of which will be made known at an inquest to be conducted at Hull Monday by Coroner Dr. J. Isabelle. The placing in custody of Mrs. Lacroix ends a three weeks investigation by provincial and Hull police authorities. According to their information Mrs. Lacroix has been conducting a "baby farm" and seven children placed in her charge, have died there since last August. The three bodies in possession of the police are those of children who died Jan. 25 and 27 and Feb. 5. They were three months old or under and, police state, were illegitimate. The names of their mothers are said to be unknown.

"The wedding is going to begin," was whispered through the crowd. It was still half an hour before the time appointed.

Meaning stage hands were energetically sweeping the space before "Cy Perkins'" old time grocery store. Up in the dressing room, where great singers and tennis stars had prepared for their triumphs, the bride, Miss Dorothy Catherine Raymond, was being dressed by the two mothers.

Little, white satin slippers with sparkling buckles, white satin bridal dress with bouffant skirt trimmed with crystal beads, and, finally, the lace veil were adjusted. Then the bride took the bouquet of white roses and lilies-of-the-valley, the gift of the Cleveland Retail Grocers' Association.

LONDON, Feb. 28.—Great Britain's reply to President Coolidge's proposal for further naval limitations accepting the President's invitation was read in the House of Commons this afternoon by Sir Austen Chamberlain and was greeted with general approval. The foreign secretary said that the terms of the reply had been concurred in by all the governments of the Empire except the Irish Free State which had not yet replied.
