Marry at Rate Of 400 a Week

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, April 21.—The marriages of Canadian soldiers in England lately has more than equalled the number of soldiers' wives being returned to Canada. A record week saw 626 Canadian soldiers married, and the average during the past six weeks has been nearly 400. There were 275 Canadians married to Belgian and French women and a few found brides in Germany during the period of occupation by the Canadians. Owing to the increase in the return of soldiers home, it is now expected that by the beginning of July not more than 25,000 Canadians will remain overseas. The majority of these will be convalescents and staffs. This is on condition that no labor troubles delay sailing.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family in any man or woman, eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entries by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. Homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in a vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader, in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
