## Foreign Missions

Endeavors in the Foreign Mission field were under review also at today's session. Rev. Dr. Hugh Munro, Chairman of the Budget Committee, said he believed the \$22,000 spent there annually was being expended "unwisely". He added it could be used to better advantage in work at home.

A resolution adopted at today's meeting recommended the holding of an annual Ministers' Conference for "careful and prayerful" consideration of ministerial problems.

Another resolution urged renewed emphasis be laid upon "the supremely important need of a spiritual revival throughout the church at large, of the deepening of the spiritual life of God's people," and that to this end evangelistic services be held yearly in all churches.

## INTERESTED IN REPORT ON LIBRARY WORK

**Carnegie Corp. Officials Hear Report on Library Work From Miss Bateson—Centers to Open in Few Weeks.**

Miss Nora Bateson, Director of the Carnegie Library Demonstration, has returned from New York City where she had a conference with officials of the Carnegie Corporation. Dr. Keppel, President of the Corporation was greatly interested in Miss Bateson's report on the progress made in the project thus far. It is generally believed by the officials that Prince Edward Island is a good unit for the demonstration, and the experiment will be followed with interest. Dr. Keppel is sure, Miss Bateson states, that the people of this Province will require only to have the books placed before them to appreciate and read them.

It is intended to open during the next few weeks several local library branches at centres. Preparations are on foot at a number of places. When the system is in operation Mr. Milton Ferguson, library advisor of the Carnegie Corporation, intends to visit the Province to conduct a survey.

"As Canadians we must all share in the sense of encouragement that the Prime Minister has inspired by his statement regarding the improvement in business conditions throughout this country. It has called our attention to indications of recovery that have become increasingly definite with each succeeding month and which have been so sustained and consistent that one can no longer doubt their significance.

"The manner in which Canada has withstood the successive shocks of world depression has revealed anew the fundamental strength of this nation and its people. No country in the world has shown greater resiliency. No country is better equipped for the upward march that lies ahead.

"In the facts cited by the Prime Minister there is convincing evidence that this advance is even now under way."

## Bank Views

M. W. Wilson, Vice-President and General Manager, Royal Bank of Canada:

"The Prime Minister has quoted statistics to show that there are definite signs of trade recovery in Canada but in my opinion these statistics do not fully reflect the improvement which has occurred. While there are still a number of clouds on the business horizon, notably the low price of wheat and the partial crop failure, business throughout Canada has shown a definite and in a number of industries a marked improvement and my confidence in a continued upward trend is strengthened by the background of what seems to be a definite world-wide recovery."

Sir Thomas White, Vice-President, Canadian Bank of Commerce:

"I fully concur with the statement of the Prime Minister as to the upturn which has taken place progressively in Canadian business during the past few months."

## ISLANDERS WIN CATTLE AWARDS AT HLFX. EXPO.

HALIFAX, Oct. 5.—New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island breeders gained all awards in today's judging of Holstein cattle at the Nova Scotia Exhibition. There were no Nova Scotian entries in this class. Provincial exhibitors, however, captured every prize except one in the Guernsey class.

The lone outsider to break into the Guernsey prize list was Guy Rodd, of Brackley, P.E.I., who gained second honors for a two-year-old bull. In this class, Roy Grant, of Falmouth, N.S., Secretary of the Guernsey Breeders' Association of Canada, found entries to be of a particularly high standard. "The top winners," he said, "would go far at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto."

Judge R. A. Profit, of Freetown, P. E. I., declared he found the Holstein exhibits "of excellent quality" also. Stressing the importance of production records, he pointed out that most of the females shown were on record of production tests.

**Tariff Truce**

"It should rather be said the efforts to attack and thoroughly investigate these problems had to be suspended," it said, with the explanation that the tariff truce to which 61 states had adhered is still in force despite some denunciations. It was emphasized the truce was made for the period of the World Economic Conference, which period has not yet ended.

"The truce means that all the country realized the necessity of ending at the earliest possible moment the daily warfare the object of which is to reduce imports by all costs and by measures of every kind," the Commission said.
