Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. A proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 20 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in a certain condition. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after entering homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cut vate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Left to Imagination
Sun: In a polite way the German Government refrains from disclosing to President Wilson its idea of the terms upon which peace might be had; and in lieu of speculations it proposes an abnormal condition of belligerents. The attitude of the Allies concerning such a proposition has already been made sufficiently apparent. They might consider terms definitely stated; they do not seem ready to go into conference with Germany at this stage of the war.

Shows Enthusiasm
Tribune: If there was any doubt in anyone's mind as to who would benefit by Mr. Wilson's peace gesture, it should be abolished now. Coolly, skillfully, completely, the Germans, in their response to Mr. Wilson's note, have turned that document to their own ends. The very promptness of their response shows enthusiasm.

British Blockade Working
Times: First of the warning powers Germany asks for a peace conference. The British blockade is doing its intended work. Peace Germany must have, and soon. That is the obvious meaning of her surprising prompt reply to the President's note. But she can never get a peace conference together on the conditions she pro-

U.S. PRESS SAYS GERMANY HAS EVADED QUESTION

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Editorial comment on Germany's reply to President Wilson's note, is published here this morning as follows:

World: Germany's answer to President Wilson's note completely evades the issue. The President requested from each of the belligerents a definite statement of the objects of the war and the terms upon which it would consider peace. Germany replied by proposing an immediate conference "of delegates of the belligerent states at a neutral place," knowing that this proposal had already been emphatically rejected by the Entente Governments.

The President did not ask for a peace conference. He recognized the fact that a conference at this time was impossible, but expressed the hope that "an interchange of views would clear the way at least for a conference." Germany refuses all interchange of views and returns to the text of the note of December 12, which contained the proposal of the "Tentative" to enter forthwith into peace negotiations.

In the light of Germany's reply to the President, it is impossible to believe that there was either honesty or sincerity of purpose back of the original peace proposal. It is plain enough now that the President's action stripped off the German mask, and that the whole proceeding was a game invented in Berlin for the propitiation of neutrals and for the further bedeviling of German public opinion.

poses. Her answer is a terrible putting of the cart before the horse. She would have an immediate meeting of delegates at a neutral place to begin negotiations for peace. But she is of the opinion that "the great work of preventing future wars can be begun only after the end of the present struggle of nations." It must begin before.

Staats-Zeitung: The German answer to President Wilson's proposal for the discussion of peace proposals has followed promptly. It should be regarded as a further step on the right road. The circumstance that Ambassador Gerard was sent for by the Kaiser permits the conclusion to be drawn that further confidential disclosures will reach the President through him. It was not to be expected that in a note whose text would undoubtedly receive publicity detailed indications could be given regarding concrete conditions of peace, the discussion of which must be reserved for a conference, participated in by representatives of all the belligerent nations. So the German note which is now at hand must amount to only a provisional agreement with the expression of the President.

Noteworthy, in addition, is the sure served agreement with the plan of the President, that after the conclusion of the actual peace negotiations steps should be taken toward the prevention of future wars. Germany has taken up her position completely on the same grounds as President Wilson and promises her ready co-operation.

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
