The work will start as soon as Messrs Reid & Archibald have the wharf made ready for it.

Everything is now being put in readiness to allow this work to be proceeded with and operations will commence very shortly. It is understood that the contract for the Elmira Branch Railway has been let to Whitehead Bros., Grand Falls, N. B. Work will commence shortly and a representative of the contractors is expected to arrive here very soon.
