PRINCE SAYS CARMEN SYLVA IS THE WORLD'S GREATEST WOMAN

NEW YORK, Jan. 21.—Guenther, Prince von Schoenburg Waldenburg, has arrived at the Ritz, on his way West.

Although German by birth, an officer in the German Emperor's Life Guards, Prince Schoenburg practically lives in Rumania, where he owns a large estate. He is somewhat reticent in talking about himself and some of his many interesting experiences, but while standing near the table in his sitting room, he picked up a magnificently bound volume.

"Here said the Prince, 'is the work of what I consider the greatest woman, the greatest genius in the world Carmen Sylva. I have known her for several years and know her well and some of the great pleasures of my life have been in the hours I have spent in conversation with her.'"

Opening the book, the Prince showed me its dedication and inscription, reading:

"To Prince Guenther—It is not so difficult to die for a friend, as to find one worth dying for."

### FARMER IS HELD IN \$1,000 BOND IN DE LUXE BOOK CASE.

BOSTON, Jan. 21.—Glenn F. Farmer, the New Yorker alleged by government investigators to be the brain of the \$15,000,000 de luxe edition swindle, in which many New England men and women of wealth were trapped, was arraigned in the Superior Criminal Court today and held for trial under bonds of \$10,000. He pleaded not guilty.

The principal complaint against Farmer, who was brought here from New York after a three weeks' flight against extradition, is Mrs. Mary L. Rogers of No. 96 Beacon street.

Farmer, it is said, lived in great style on Riverside Drive, overlooking the Hudson, and at the time of his arrest was in business with his father on Fifth Avenue.

### FEARS FOR LIVES OF ASQUITH CABINET.

LONDON, Jan. 21.—There are dark rumors about London as to what the militant suffragettes intend to do when, as they fear, Sir Edward Grey's amendment to the franchise bill giving votes to women, may be defeated in the House of Commons on Friday.

The dislocation of the electric street cars by tampering with the underground conduits and a wholesale dislocation of the telephones are the mildest retaliatory actions hinted at. Scotland Yard is anxious over the situation and precautions unparalleled are being made on the strength of the information that the lives of the government members may be threatened.

Although the leading militants do not sanction killing, it is pointed out by those close to the police authorities that the peril lies in the individual action of the hysterical women and the profession that they are ready to die for the "cause." Every member of the cabinet is more closely guarded than ever, and to the extent of very irritating personal surveillance.

"What has been done before will be child's play, as compared with what is to come," is the lurid threat of the headquarters of the militants.

The franchise bill is engrossing the attention of the politicians to the exclusion of the Welsh church bill, which will continue to be under debate in the Commons until Wednesday, inclusive.

Lord Curzon aroused frenzied enthusiasm at the anti-suffrage meeting in Queen's Hall last night, by declaring:

"We don't want an open door at all not to the million women dressed up as municipal electors or thirteen million women marching as a vanguard of the great army which will eventually take charge of the destinies of state."

Members of parliament, both Liberal and Unionist, members of the aristocracy and representative of arts and letters, constituted the gathering which met the protest against the female suffrage amendment to the franchise bill which comes before the Commons on Friday.

The topic is monopolizing political interest and embarrassing the government more than any other.

Mr. Humphrey Ward was a picturesque figure in lace cap and black gown.

"Women with votes," she declared, "would be inferior political units serving as raw material for the political purposes of men."

### SIX HURT AS "MOVIES" BURN OUT.

WOONSOCKET, R. I., Jan. 21.—Fire which started at five a. m. in Lynch's Theatre, a moving picture house, overcame and injured Chief J. Cole and five firemen and did \$50,000 damage to the Exchange Building and its contents in Maine street.

The firemen had a hard struggle to prevent the flames from spreading through the business section. The Exchange building is in the busiest part of Main street. Lynch's Theatre is on the first floor. It is a house seating about 1,000. The fire spread rapidly from this place to Eureka Hall, leased by Woonsocket Lodge of Odd Fellows, and to Falk Brothers' clothing store.

### SENDS WARSHIP TO PROTECT AMERICANS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Secretary of State Knox to-day decided to send at least one American warship to Vera Cruz to protect Americans and their property here.

### THE ANNUAL MEETING OF Y. M. C. A.

(Continued from page one) year to meet the needs in the social room.

The report of the Religious work committee was read by the Secretary in the absence of the chairman J. D. Seaman. In the boys and students department there was held during the year 28 meetings with an average attendance of 26. These meetings are usually led by one of the boys themselves. There have been enrolled 112 in student Bible classes, and 79 in boys' classes during the year. "The good resulting from this Bible study eternity alone will reveal."

Several evangelistic meetings were held while the Militia was in camp with an average attendance of 125 men and good interest. The regular men's meetings were not continued owing to the small attendance of men. Three young men have united with the church during the year as the result of Association activities. There has recently been organized 8 mission study classes one of which is a normal class under the direction of Prof. Steele of the Prince of Wales College staff.

The report of the Educational committee was read by the chairman R. H. Campbell, Superintendent of Education with an enrollment of 30 books had been drawn from the library during the year. The class in wireless telegraphy under the instruction of Keith Rogers has an enrollment of 22 at present. They meet regularly in a room which has been fitted up for them in the drill shed. A class of boys is now in operation taking up the regular school work under the direction of Mrs. Brehaut.

The work of the Physical department was reported by the chairman Jas. A. McMillan. Splendid work has been done during the year by the men who had served as Physical Directors viz., C. H. O'Riordan last year and the present Physical Director Frank B. McComb. Last year there were five classes with an enrollment of 80 men and boys, and this season there is the same number of classes with an enrollment of 87. "The Senior basketball league last winter was played off between the P. W. C. Boys and the Victorias and won by the college team. The second college team won the intermediate league from the three other competing teams. A league was promoted in the advanced intermediate group last spring with four teams. There have been several boys' leagues.

In hockey the Y. M. C. A. team won the championship in the city league. A league was played off among the boys. In baseball the Association team entered the city league and tied for second place with the Victorias, losing to the Vics. in the play off. Several football games were played with Prince of Wales. Last season there was one girl's class and this season there are two. The gymnasium has been repaired and cleaned and put in good order.

General Secretary Rely submitted his report and spoke of several features not included in any of the committee reports. During the year he attended Conventions in Truro and Wm'g at which the plan for the development of the work in the Dominion was changed. He spoke briefly of the changes being made and of the Nationalizing of the Canadian Y. M. C. A. work. The Maritime boys camp was led by Secretary Rely and was attended by 12 P. E. I. boys and sixty boys from the other Maritime Provinces.
