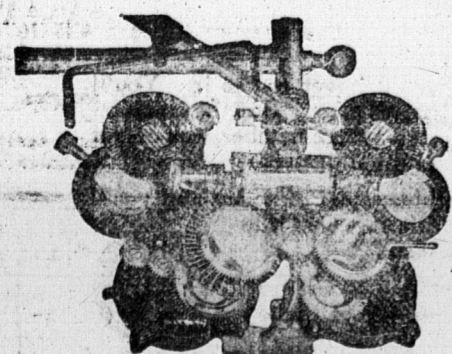

FROM DEMARARA.—The St. John Telegraph says: Mrs. Pugsley (nee Miss Della Sisson), of Demarara, wife of one of our missionary teachers (at present visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Norman Sisson, of Three Brooks and Plaster Rock, Victoria county. She has been obliged to leave the tropics on the advice of her doctor. Mr. Pugsley will return during the summer and will probably complete his course at the Presbyterian College, Halifax. On her way home, Mrs. Pugsley had the pleasure of seeing Rev. W. I. Green and his four boys at Trinidad. Mr. Green is feeling fit and as usual is untruly busy in his work among the East Indians in his mission field. His sister from P. E. Island is at present with him.

MAGDALEN ISLAND SERVICE.—In October last a contract was let to the Gulf of St. Lawrence Shipping and Trading Company of Quebec for a service twice a week from Pictou to the Magdalen Islands, calling at Souris, Prince Edward Island—the same service as performed heretofore says the Halifax Chronicle. Under said contract this Company was to provide a new boat suitable for the service at the opening of 1919 navigation. This, however, was not done and the Company proposed placing a two hundred ton trawler on the route which was strongly objected to by the Halifax Board of Trade and others interested. The contractors have now purchased the steamer "Lady Evelyn", 155 gross tons, with adequate freight and passenger accommodation for this service. Before being used this craft will have to undergo certain changes, after which she will be put on the route. It has been promised by the Company that a suitable steamer for this service will be built and ready for use upon the opening of 1920 navigation.

A meeting was held in the city Magistrate's room last evening for the purpose of planning a canvass of the city to ascertain the sentiment of the people re the present prohibition law.
