TO STRENGTHEN HER ALLIANCE

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Official information, received here, but as yet unpublished, shows a development of German policy of grave moment to the British Empire.
The Triple Alliance, formed about 1882, and since renewed, in order to check the other great land powers, Russia and France, in the interests of Germany, Austria, and Italy, has now been enlarged to include full naval, as well as military co-operation.

In recent years Italy had a naval understanding with Great Britain, having special reference to the eastern question, but providing for common action by the British and Italian fleets in the Mediterranean in case of war.

Under the new terms, the Alliance and Italy's naval position towards Germany and Austria ceased to be one of the mere benevolent friendliness. This development helps to explain Germany's action in stationing a powerful cruiser squadron in the Mediterranean. She engaged with Austria and Italy that Germany represented in the Mediterranean by a Dreadnought cruiser and four other cruisers, detached from the North Sea.

ANTICIPATED AMENDING GERMAN NAVAL LAW

It is anticipated that the German naval law will be shortly again amended, to provide for more battle cruisers. The Kaiser's friend, Grand Admiral Von Koester, has already opened a campaign to this end.
Germany and her staunchly-bound allies have now built, or are building, fifteen Dreadnoughts for service in the Mediterranean, intended to dominate Great Britain's main food artery and highway to India and Australasia. Great Britain's fleet built, and building, for the Mediterranean comprises four Dreadnoughts only.

This is a problem now causing the gravest uneasiness to the Admiralty and the British Cabinet in solving which three Canadian ships could have been inculcated direct and indirect assistance.

Mr. Winston Churchill's estimates now before the Cabinet exceed \$250,000,000. In his last speech, he warned the public that even that colossal sum did not represent the cost of British sea supremacy, in face of the new naval combination in the Mediterranean. Naturally, in view of this enlarged co-operation with Germany the Austrian Government is most anxious not to affront, so powerful a German personage as Herr Ballin and his allies in the Northern States.

DIFFICULTY WITH PART NOT KNOWING FACTS

The difficulty arises with a large section of the party in and out of Parliament, who are unacquainted with the exact facts of the Mediterranean, and fear that the swollen estimates will wreck the policy of social reform.
The Rt. Hon. C. E. H. Hobhouse, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster and a member of the Cabinet, replying to his Bristol constituents who demand lessened armaments says:—
"If you find that the number of persons in Europe likely to disturb the peace has increased in numbers and power to disturb the peace you have increased your own forces to resist potential disturbances. I will not mention names. I think you all know what is in my mind, and what is in yours."
Mr. Churchill's bitterest critics are in his own party headed by the Daily News and Leader and the Daily Chronicle. The Unionist Pall Mall Gazette says these radical outbursts only secure for Mr. Churchill the in-

LOCAL HISTORY.—The history of Prince Edward Island is in many respects most interesting. It has never yet been adequately written up, because none of the local historians have ever had the advantage of access to those original documents that would furnish a complete record. As far as can be the Canadian Archives is aiming to make a complete collection of all materials bearing on the history of this as well as the other Maritime Provinces and its agents have been travelling throughout Great Britain and France in the interests of this history. The Archives is represented in the Maritime Provinces by Mr. W. C. Miller, who is now making another visit to the Island collecting local material.

WEDDING BELLS.—A very pretty home wedding takes place tonight at 6 o'clock when Miss Laura Etta Callbeck, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Callbeck, North Tryon, will become the bride of Mr. Hedley B. Weeks, a leading fox-hunter of North Tryon. The house will be artistically decorated for the occasion with flowers and ferns, the ceremony being performed by Rev. G. M. Young, in the presence of about fifty invited guests. The bride will be handsomely gowned in white silk with veil and orange blossoms and will carry a choice bouquet of white carnations and maiden hair fern, while the bridesmaid, Miss Annie Weeks, the groom's sister, will wear a becoming gown of pink silk, carrying a pretty bouquet. The groomsmen will be the bride's brother Mr. Lea Callbeck. Many very handsome gifts have been received, including cut glass, silver, etc. The Mission Band presented Miss Callbeck with a richly bound volume of Tennyson's poems while the groom's gift to her is a magnificent Player Piano. The bridesmaid received a handsome diamond ring, while the groomsmen were remembered with a set of initialled cuff links. MR. CHURCHILL'S VISIT TO WINDSOR CASTLE
It is possibly significant that Mr. Churchill visited Windsor Castle hurriedly on Tuesday, where discussions have been proceeding between Sir Edward Grey and Count Albert Mensdorff, the Austrian Ambassador in London, Sir Arthur Nicolson, permanent Under-Secretary at the Foreign Office, and Sir Maurice de Bunsen, the newly appointed British Ambassador to Vienna.

It is understood that these high officials are following up the conversations between the King and his visitor, Archduke Franz Ferdinand, regarding the future of the Balkan States and relative strength of fleets in the Mediterranean.

TALKED OVER MEXICAN SITUATION.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25.—Sir William Tyrrell, private secretary to Sir Edward Grey, the British Foreign Secretary, had a brief conference with President Wilson, on Saturday night, to reveal the subject discussed, saying it was personal and private.
Sir William has been here for several weeks and on account of the illness of Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, has interested himself considerably in the Mexican situation. It became known that Saturday night's conference was his second with the president, and that on the first occasion he had a frank talk on Mexican affairs.
This interchange of views is believed to have resulted in the friendly understanding that since has existed between Great Britain and the United States concerning the policy toward

Mexico. The British Government has indicated not only to the Washington administration, but to the Huerta regime, that it is warmly supporting the policy of President Wilson.
It is known that the confidence of the Washington administration in ultimately forcing the retirement of Huerta, is based largely on the friendly attitude of the great Powers abroad, who are declining to assist the Huerta Government financially or otherwise.
