SUDDEN DEATH OF GEORGE H. TURNER.

The following from a Torrington, Conn., exchange will be of interest here as Mr. Turner is a brother of Mrs. A. D. Duchemin, Charlottetown. George H. Turner, who has been in business for seven years connected with the Coe Brass Company in Torrington, died this morning at the Hahnemann Hospital in New York following an operation which was performed last Tuesday morning. Death was wholly unexpected to his many friends and business associates. It was thought that his trouble was not serious and that the operation would be comparatively simple, requiring only about twenty minutes, but the surgeons found his condition much more serious than they had expected and the operation required about two hours. In spite of this, however, he rallied from the effects of the operation and all through Tuesday night and yesterday his condition seemed most favorably for a speedy recovery. Mr. Turner was a native of Prince Edward Island and was about forty-five years of age. Practically all of his business life was spent in the metal industry. He was first associated with the U. T. Hungerford Brass & Copper Company, of New York, and later with the firm of Wallace & Sons, of Ansonia, when the factory of this last-named firm was purchased by the Coe Brass Company in 1895. Mr. Turner became connected with that company where he continued until seven years ago when he came to Torrington. Here he became a strong factor in the business and held successively the offices of assistant secretary and secretary of the Coe Brass Company, and a vice president of the American Brass Company since January 1, 1912, when the subordinate companies were taken over by the holding company. During his residence in Torrington Mr. Turner made many friends and was held in the highest esteem by everybody who knew him, and especially by those who were associated with him in business, in which circles he was known as a man of unusual ability, and of great ability and personal qualities were recognized and appreciated by the companies with which he was connected, as evidenced by the frequent promotions which were tendered to him. His death is considered a great loss to his friends and to The American Brass Company. He is survived by his wife and one brother in this country and by his mother and a sister in Prince Edward Island. His father died only last week. A special car attached to the train arriving here at 1.30 o'clock this afternoon brought the body from New York. Mrs. Turner was accom-
