FAR FROM PENNILESS

Leiter Sr. Has \$20,000,000 Left.

BUT HAS LOST A LOT

There Are Other Things Owned by Mr. Leiter, and He Alone Knows their Value—Lots of Property Gone.

CHICAGO, July 27.—Levi Z. Leiter will not have to forego any of the comforts of life because of his son Joseph's wheat deal. He will have a few millions left after he has settled Joseph's debts.

He is only fifty-four years old and has a healthy body and a head and face like Salisbury. He comes from Dutch stock. He was born in Leitersburg, Md., and began active life as a clerk in a country store. When he came to Chicago he sought similar employment, and with Marshall Field, became a clerk in the dry goods house of Cooley, Wadsworth & Co. This was in 1856. Six years later the firm that employed him became the firm of Farwell, Field & Co. Leiter was the "C."

The firm prospered, and in 1865 Leiter, Field and Potter Palmer established, and conducted it jointly until 1881 when a disagreement occurred between Leiter and Field, and the former withdrew. Potter Palmer had already withdrawn, and so Field was left in sole possession of the business.

Leiter then began dabbling in real estate. He gathered in a few good business corners, turned them over at a handsome profit, and then purchased more until he became the heaviest owner of real estate in the city. The value of his holdings have been moderately estimated at \$25,000,000.

Leiter plunged into society and secured a permanent place there when one of his daughters married George N. Gurnon, a wealthy Englishman of good family. He has always been generous with his money and ready to help any one worthy of assistance. Recently his wife converted the Chickamauga Park Hotel at Chickamauga into a hospital for sick soldiers.

In addition to his property the Leiter holdings of stocks and securities were recently estimated at \$8,000,000. They included stock in the Chicago City Railway Company, Chicago Edison Company and Southside Elevated Railway Company, in all of which Joseph Leiter is a director. He is first vice-president of the Chicago City Railway Company, which like the Central Music Halls, is a gold mine to the stockholders.

The elder Leiter is a big holder of stock of the Illinois Trust and Savings Bank, of which he is a leading director. This institution is the greatest of its kind in the West.

In addition to the stock mentioned, Mr. Leiter is a large owner of the stock of the Chicago Burlington & Quincy Railroad and the Pennsylvania System, but the exact amount is known only to himself. He also owns largely of Chicago Gas stock.

Conservative estimates put Mr. Leiter's fortune at \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000 before the Joseph incident.
