Opening of Navigation School

The Navy League School of Navigation opened for instruction this morning in the League Building, with Lieut. Commander W. G. Lewis, R. N. R., in charge. The class for the present comprises three pupils, Messrs. Fred Gallant, North Rustico, A. Trator and Arthur McCarron, city. Several other applications have been received, and there is no doubt but that the school, under such efficient instruction and with so complete an equipment for the turning out of master seamen, will be well attended throughout the coming months.

The Examiner representative was shown this morning through the class room and had explained to him a bewildering array of nautical instruments all very wonderful and mysterious to a land-lubber. The instruments are for the most part the work of English Admiralty makers, and are of the latest and most accurate type. The sextant, made by the Heath Company, of England, is simply the very best that could be procured. Its points of beauty being visible even to the green eye of the reporter. Several ship models, illustrative of various mast head light signals carried at sea and a complete semaphore model were next shown. A complete commercial signal code has been installed. Then came the hydrometer (a device for testing the density of water) the salinometer, the planisphere (adjustable charts showing the position of the stars at any given season) the collapsible, the devisorcope (a wonderful model representing a ship's hull, capable of being subjected to varying magnetic attractions and devised for the purpose of teaching compass adjustment), and many other things, including complete sets of large scale maps and plans, navigation books, tables, charts, etc.

The scheme of instruction, as explained by the instructor, is one rather of private coaching than class-teaching. Every student must work

The old idea of teaching in classes, and of hurrying the slower students through lessons half understood for the sake of convenience to the majority, doesn't appeal to Commander Lewis. The length of time, therefore, upon which prospective students may figure on remaining at school, is dependent very much upon themselves. The wide experience of Commander Lewis as a seaman and as instructor at the Royal Naval School, Plymouth and the charm of his genial personality which no student can fail to be deeply influenced by, will go far in making the Navigation School under his direction a successful institution of its kind and a credit to the Province.

TIMES AS LARGE AS SUN
WITH WONDERFUL DEVICE



PROF. ALBERT A. MICHELSON
An achievement regarded by scientists as stupendous has been announced by Prof. Albert A. Michelson, of the University of Chicago and internationally known as a scientist. He announced the perfection of a device for measuring the diameter of stars by interference methods. Prof. Michelson stated that one of the stars of the constellation of Orion, which is trillions of miles from the earth, has a diameter a little more than 300 times that of the sun, or 260,000,000 miles. He conducted his experiments and observations with the eight foot reflecting telescope at the Mount Wilson Observatory in Southern Cal. Prof. Michelson won the Nobel Prize for Physics in 1907.

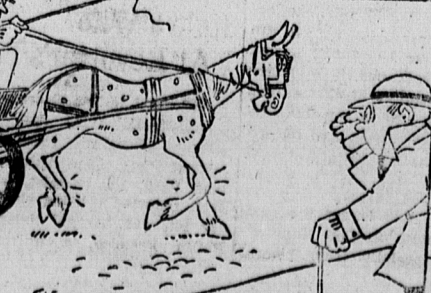

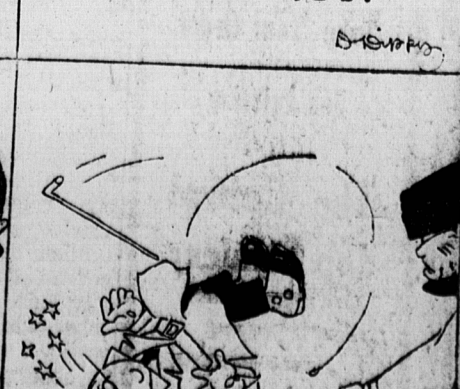
