U. K. Cattle Requirements Are Emphasized

The following article is from a Turco, N. S. exchange:

A recent open letter to Canadian cattle dealers interested in overseas shipments contains a warning which not only the dealer but the breeder would do well to heed coming as it does from a British dealer of long experience. He cites instances where the shipment was neither fit for beef nor dairy purposes and where the returns were disastrous in the extreme.

This dealer goes on to say that first calving heifers are not popular and advises shippers to handle only cows well forward with their second or third calf. Dual purpose Shorthorn, he states, are the most choice and then grades from Ayrshire or Holstein cow sired by Shorthorn bulls. Full information as to date of calving, breed of sire, with production credentials of both sire and dam, in fact all possible information should be furnished with each individual.

We feel like congratulating the farmers in our Pure Bred Areas.

Right in Colchester County we have a territory some sixty by twenty miles, where no scrub sire will be used after the present year. This area should be extremely popular in the near future with the

careful overseas buyer, especially when coupled up with the better sires in almost every community due to the cow testing associations the farmer can furnish full production particulars for the last lactation period. By taking full advantage of the assistance which this service is ready to render, these pure bred areas will be in a splendid position to prove out the sires used in their herds and make real progress in increased production.

Breeders who want to get into this overseas trade whether for beef or dairy cattle must surely realize that this market cannot be secured by using any but the best sires procurable. And besides that in many instances there must be a change in feeding methods before we can secure the well grown, uniform car lots that will bring back a fair return of outside coin for our Nova Scotia communities.

We should remember that we are at the most favorable point in Canada so far as shipping is concerned. Our shrinkage would be practically nil as compared with the long hauls from Western Canada.

Breeders who would like to get a future outlet for their cattle whether in beef or dairy stock would do well to remember that while we have a great advantage over the Western farmer in the matter of freight rates and shrinkage we cannot produce the well grown uniform car lots that bring back the best returns, unless we use the best sires procurable and also change our feeding methods very materially growing our young things as rapidly as possible in the first year or two of their existence.

Ladies and Gentlemen and Players:—Tonight we have just witnessed with a great deal of interest and pleasure the final game of the N. S. Improvement In Australian Financial Outlook

OTTAWA, March 28.—The Canadian Government Merchant Marine Limited, due to depressed trade conditions and fewer sailings, had a decrease of forty per cent in operating revenues in 1932 as compared with 1931, according to the annual report tabled in the House of Commons today by the Hon. R. J. Manion, Minister of Railways and Canals. Operating revenues in 1932 were \$2,261,755, a decrease of \$1,527,473. Operating expenses at \$2,538,368 were \$1,645,145 under 1931.

"The company, in common with steamship companies generally, has had to face a succession of bad years of trade," says the report. "This depression still continues and the outlook is uncertain, although present indications point towards distinct improvement in the volume of Australian and New Zealand traffic. The decrease in operating expenses of \$1,645,145 reflects the decreased number of sailings and the close supervision of operating expenses, both ashore and afloat. All salaries and wages have been reduced by not less than ten per cent."

"It will be noted," the report continues, "that in the income account the net income deficit for the year is stated at \$4,197,349. To the operating deficit of \$326,613 is added bookkeeping accruals for depreciation and interest on Government notes and advances amounting to \$3,870,736. The management can only repeat that as such accruals are based on the war time costs of vessels and have no relation to the present value of the vessels in service, the result is distorted to an unusual degree. If restated on a reasonable appraisal the deficit for the year would be \$487,185, made up of \$326,613 operating deficit and \$160,572 for interest and depreciation."

"The fleet now consists of 23 steamers. During 1932 the following vessels were disposed of at prices varying from \$1.26 to \$2.52 per deadweight ton: "Canadian Beaver," "Canadian Commander," "Canadian Explorer," "Canadian Farmer," "Canadian Miller," "Canadian Ranger" and "Canadian Traveller."

The Company's fleet was navigated throughout the year without casualties of any description. The vessels of the fleet steamed 546,597 miles during this period.

At the close of the St. Lawrence season of navigation in 1932 it was decided to withdraw from the Inter-coastal service; the vessels so employed, together with other surplus tonnage are being disposed of by the management as opportunity offers. The service now in operation consists of a monthly sailing from Atlantic to Australian ports, and a monthly sailing from Atlantic to New Zealand ports. An arrangement is also in existence whereby traffic destined to Canada is turned over by foreign lines at the Panama Canal to the C. G. M. M. Australian and New Zealand vessels, this tonnage thus entering the Dominion through a Canadian port.

Receives Cablegram From German Crown Prince

NEW YORK, Mar. 28.—(A. P.)—George Sylvester Viereck, the author, today announced he received a cablegram from the former German Crown Prince, Frederick Wilhelm, deploring that the American people should become "victimized" by what he termed a "propaganda of lies" against the German Government. The message read:

"Your letter about the similarity between the tales of cruelty in Germany recently spread in foreign countries and the anti-German propaganda before America entered the war is unfortunately too true.

I am, however, unable to comprehend how the public in other countries after having been able to convince themselves a few years ago how very much they were deceived with regard to Germany during the World War, can once more fall victims to such a blind mental attitude.

"Everyone who knows Germany, the German character and the culture of the German people must feel at once that the news spread at present about the putting out of eyes, the mutilation of corpses, the searing of parts of the body, etc., must be just as mendacious as the war-time tales of horrors about the mutilation of Belgian children, the crucified Canadian and the factories in which corpses were converted into soap.

"And yet there are perhaps people among the larger public unfamiliar with Germany who are victimized by this propaganda of lies. If men who had personal experience during the World War would contribute from their own experience to enlightening the American public about the truth they would be performing a service not only to the German nation, whose honor these evil-minded reports are intended to tarnish, but also to the whole world and to the friendly atmosphere between the nations which is poisoned by these malicious Germans."

"We in Germany, like you in the United States, are endeavoring to escape from the misery in which the Western World has been sunk during the post-war years, and to return to a fresh state of prosperity, peace and renewed strength. Every people does this in its own way and on its own terms. It is not fair to strew the path of others with lies and calumnies."

An electric light "gun" that "shoots" landing and take-off signals at air pilots is now being tested at an airport in Los Angeles, Calif. It has a conventional pistol grip and sights, and when aimed and fired with a trigger, it flashes red or green lights, equally visible by day or night for 20 miles. The beam gun has been developed by the Department of Commerce to supplant flag signals for directing fliers when to land and take off.
