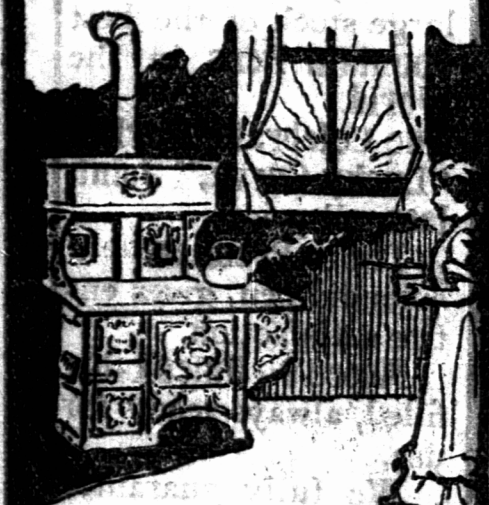

### THE RETURN OF THE PREMIER.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier has received a very warm welcome in Quebec, Montreal and Ottawa since his return to Canada after his prolonged absence. While away he has attended the King's Coronation, has visited extensively in the British Isles, France and the Continent, and has every where been received with the honor and distinction fitting to one of the great men of the British Empire. Everywhere he has shown—not less in France than in Britain—that he is a thoroughly loyal subject of the Crown, devotedly attached to British institutions, and everywhere he has won new regard for Canada, the land of his birth, and the country of his pride. He has publicly said since his return that he comes back to us "more a Canadian than ever."

In his replies to the addresses presented to him Sir Wilfrid Laurier has not spoken with any particularity of the Cabinet troubles at home nor of the work he has been engaged upon while abroad. In this we feel that he has been wise. In due time and when more fully conversant with the situation he will speak. We regret that his health is not more robust. The friendly Herald of Montreal speaks of him as "thin from the strain and fatigue of his voyage and the long visit to England and the Continent." This is not quite assuring. We trust that rest at home will restore his usual vigor. Meanwhile the reports of his rather weak condition have drawn the hearts of the people to him in a remarkable way. Sir Wilfrid is much beloved in Canada, as a statesman of high ideals, who has served his country for over thirty years without reproach, and one whose many qualities of mind and heart have challenged the admiration of all who met him.

The plucky challenge of Sir Thomas Dipton for the American Cup ensures an active yachting season for 1903. The new Shamrock is expected to be a considerably faster sailer than the last and a new defender is to be designed by Herrshoff, who is perhaps the most famous designer of fast sailing yachts in the world.

The Crown Prince of Siam now visiting the United States is described as a high-class Oriental gentleman and scholar. Prince Vajiravada was educated at Eton and Oxford, speaks English perfectly, is versed in the Latin and Greek classics and well read in English literature. He has the charm of a graceful personality and polished manners and is an author of no mean reputation. Our American cousins are becoming used to the visits of eastern royalties. Henry of Prussia played the role of Prince Charming among them recently, and the escapades of Grand Duke Boris of Russia were such that Mr. Roosevelt, to her infinite credit, declined to meet him. The Prince of Siam comes as a great contrast and relief after Boris.

The meeting on Monday evening of the Farmers' Institute at Long Creek was not an encouraging one for the few who favor guaranteeing the Dominion Packing Company's bonds. Hon. D. Farquharson felt obliged to express his strong disapproval of the guarantee scheme, and his words have weight in that locality as well as in many others. On the same night an Institute meeting was held at Mayfield, which, we are informed, was more than distrustful of the Dominion Packing Company's proposals. Our shrewd, intelligent farmers are very properly suspicious of the Province being seduced into becoming a "surety for strangers."

The discovery of petroleum in the Transvaal, and the report that the oil area is a large one and the oil of excellent quality is a pleasing piece of news. How much it may mean for the future of that country will depend upon the extent and quality of the product. Rich oil fields may do as much as the discoveries of gold and diamonds in past years to cause an influx of immigration and a development of wealth in South Africa. With oil fields added to the most productive gold-mines in the world and diamond mines which are the almost exclusive producers of these gems, and with many other important resources, British South Africa may yet astonish the world. This outlook is the more gratifying from the fact that the Boer war has made it an exceedingly costly possession.
