**Czech Doctor Says Top Nazis Visited Dachau**  
BY JAMES F. KING  
NUERNBERG, Germany, Jan. 11 (AP)—A Czech doctor who spent four years at Dachau told the International Tribunal trying 22 ranking Nazis today that five of the defendants had visited the notorious concentration camp and he dramatically pointed out four of them.  
The reaction was swift. Wilhelm Frick, former Minister of the Interior and one of the men pointed out by the Czech, Dr. Franz Blaha, shook his fist and angrily demanded through his counsel that he be given a chance to take the stand immediately to "confront" his accuser.  
Another defendant pointed out by Dr. Blaha was Alfred Rosenberg, Nazi party philosopher. His counsel joined with Frick's lawyer in denying that Rosenberg and Frick had been at the camp.  
The presiding justice told the lawyers that all defendants would get an opportunity to present their case but they would have to wait their turn.  
Dr. Blaha testified that he personally had seen Rosenberg and Frick at Dachau and that he had been told three other defendants, Walther Funk, former Reichsbank President, Fritz Sauckel, in charge of slave labor, and Ernst Kaltenbrunner one-time Security Police Chief, had made inspection visits there. He pointed to Funk and Sauckel also. Kaltenbrunner was not in court because of a cranial hemorrhage.  
Dr. Blaha's words, testimony at the Dachau trials led to the sentencing of 40 officials and guards—36 of whom received death sentences—was presented as a surprise witness after the prosecution completed cases against two top financiers of the Nazi regime, Funk and Dr. Hjalmar Schacht.  
Dr. Blaha's appearance produced an emotional shock among the defendants, several of whom boiled over with their hands clinching the rails.

**Security Police Reveal Spy Story**  
MONTREAL, Jan. 12 (CP)—The files of the R.C.M.P. Security Police, which were closed book today, revealed the story of a plot to destroy the Montreal airport at night by Dorval, jumping off points for aircraft being flown to Britain, containing the tale of a pretty Canadian girl, daughter of a German mother, and an escaped German, but the girl was dismissed. Soon after, she moved to the United States with her mother, where American intelligence men intercepted a parcel addressed to Montreal. Security guards were advised and the Service Police began to watch the girl. She was earning \$300 a month. They lived in an apartment house, but her escorts found month with the Transport Command and her mother earned \$300 month rent at \$175.  
Police discovered the three nights a week were spent at mysterious meetings both today and then. They questioned her, and the leased, was one of the busy stenographer. The girl, whose name was not revealed, was working for a Transport Command in 1943, and always had dates with airmen. She devoted four nights a week to the girl and her books for a stenographer. There was real it contained detailed plans of a Boston ship yard, and specifications of battleships to be launched there, as well as information on Montreal Airport.  
U.S. officials went to pick up the girl and her books, but they had disappeared. Later they were traced to Argentina.  
The following winter, many German prisoners who escaped from internment camps were caught in ditches near the airport. One man who asked for a hot dog at a roadside restaurant not far from Dorval, aroused the curiosity of a girl behind the counter. Police were called, and once again Capt. Von Foerster, a German U-boat commander, was under guard.  
Von Foerster told police that he had orders to damage the airport if he could escape. In England, before being transferred to Canada, they were briefed on the layout of the airfield, with photographs gathered from a number of newspapers.  
Later, a raid on internment camps in Canada found dozens of little instructions for the prisoners. The German code word most prominently featured was "Valley of God." This referred to the Dorval airport. The code word and landed in the Northern Quebec district near Val D'Or.

**Shortage Slows N.S. Rural Electrification**  
HALIFAX, Jan. 11 (CP)—Shortage of materials is slowing post-war extension of rural electrification in Nova Scotia, but experiments now in progress may result in the founding of a valuable new lumber market, at the same time allowing the completion of a five-year, multi-million-dollar program in rural electrification.  
The Nova Scotia Power Commission plans to lay 1,500 miles of lines in the next five years, a project which will involve a capital expenditure of \$25,000,000 and annual maintenance costs of \$243,350 in its peak year, Commission officials disclosed.  
One of the obstacles to the rural electrification program is a shortage of eastern cedar poles normally obtained from New Brunswick and Quebec. To overcome this shortage, native woods are being

**Musicals Revived in Manhattan**

NEW YORK, Jan. 12 (CP)—"Ol' Man River," as has been remarked by just about every baritone and basso in the business, kicked off a revival phenomenon currently demonstrated by the successful revival here of the late Jerome Kern's "Show Boat."  
Dignified New York critics, who in recent sessions have been hanging the tag "greatest American musical ever written" on either "Oklahoma!" or "Carousel," left the opening night of "Show Boat" wondering if perhaps they hadn't overlooked the 1927 hit when applying the albino adhesive.  
Its present \$300,000 production by Oscar Hammerstein II—who wrote the book and lyrics for Mr. Kern's music—shows the work off to excellent advantage, and loses nothing in comparison to the original staging by the late Flo Ziegfeld.  
Carole Bruce and Jan Clayton both got rave notices for their singing of the Kern melodies; Kenneth Spencer's "Carole" shared depressingly in a spasm of first-night jitters but presumably is in better voice by now; Ralph Duke was adequate in the "Cap'n Andy" role.  
Also added was a new song—"Nobody Else But Me"—written by Mr. Kern a few days before he died last November. It's one of his best. His other "Show Boat" melodies include "If I Were a Rich Man," "Why Do I Love You," "My Girl," the aforementioned "Ol' Man River" and the rest—are as fresh and tuneful as ever in their original setting, surviving nearly 20 years and a juke-box slaughter in an amazing display of the virility of excellence.  
Other recent openings noted briefly: "Nobody's Hero" by Arthur Laurents is a sincere attempt to capture the battlefield emotions of the Second Great War. It's a bit obvious as to how "narrow" and lifeless as to characterization but still is perhaps one of the best of a bad lot of plays yet written about the recent war. "The Children" by S. N. Behrman is another set of programs by this master of the bon mot, but a pretty tawdry bit of theatre nonetheless, and one for which a cast including Julie Hayek, Luther Adler and Dennis King can't do much.

**Find Ephedrine Horse Stimulant**  
NEW YORK, Jan. 11 (AP)—Tests on 11 horses, ranging from a two-year-old thoroughbred to a 15-year-old draft horse known as "The Killer" offered convincing proof that ephedrine is a stimulant, a veterinarian testified today at the hearing of trainer Tom Smith's appeal against a one-year suspension from racing.  
Smith, now in California, was ruled off the track after one of his assistants was caught spraying the nostrils of Magnific Duel of the Maine Chance Stables before a race at Jamaica last Nov. 1. At previous sessions of the present hearing Smith's counsel has produced expert testimony to the effect that ephedrine does not stimulate when administered in the quantity used on Magnific Duel. The hearing will be completed Monday.
