JUDGMENT ON APPEAL—At the Court of Appeals and Equity yesterday morning judgment was delivered in the case of Gavin Harding, vs. J. Watson Fyfe, respondent. Judgment was given by the Chief Justice. The appeal was from a decree of the Vice-Chancellor and was dismissed with costs. The disagreement arose over the division of a potato

crop grown last year at Grahams Road. Gaudet, K. C., appeared for the appellant and Stewart, K. C., and J. A. MacDonald for the respondent.

SUPREME COURT—The Michaelmas term of the Supreme Court opened yesterday morning with Chief Justice Matheson and Associate Judges Arsenault and Hazard on the Bench. There are no criminal cases, the docket being made up as follows: Jan. Eden and ano vs. the City of Charlottetown; Garfield Johnston re Certipari; Shaw McMillan vs. Daniel McGregor; Frederick C. Jones vs. H. Hooper, Horne and ano.; John A. McDonald, appellant, vs. John McQuirk, respondent. The first case called was that of Eden vs. the City of Charlottetown. Mr. C. Gavin Duffy, K. C., appeared for Eden and Mr. K. J. Martin, K. C., for the city. This case was the argument of a demurrer on whether the plaintiffs, formerly city assessors, have the right to bring action against the city for wages for the year 1920, which the Finance Committee refuses to pay as the men have been discharged before their three year term is completed. The plaintiffs are also suing for their salaries for 1922. Argument was completed yesterday afternoon, judgment being reserved. The Court adjourned until 11 a. m. today.
