CLOSE OF THE SESSION.

The Provincial Legislature closed its session yesterday, and the members, especially those from the farming districts, were no doubt greatly pleased to be released from further attendance. It is now the time of year when those engaged in farming and dairying are especially needed at home. There was, however, a much better excuse for a late sitting this spring than in previous years and the results appear to have justified it. The earlier part of the session was no doubt dilatory, while the Government were waiting for tidings from Ottawa in regard to our claim. But since the House met after the short adjournment the business of the country has been pressed forward most energetically.

The first session of the new century will be memorable for some time in the future for some of the measures enacted and the events brought about during the sitting. Most important of these is the settlement of our winter service claim. The Government were right in energetically and persistently pressing the matter to a settlement at the present time. The time was auspicious, and if the present opportunity had been permitted to slip away, it might never have returned. It is not always that the federal treasury overflows. We will not always have Sir Louis Davies or another equally earnest and able to look after Island interests within the Cabinet.

One of the more important measures of the session is the Road Act. There has long been a pretty general belief that the old road system was antiquated, productive of abuses and gave very inadequate returns for the money and labor it exacted. The change made is a radical and revolutionary one, and we think will be found to be a real step in advance. It is not improbable that some amendments may be found advisable after the new system has been for a time in actual working, but that will in no way modify the fact that a radical change from the old system had become necessary. Let us hope we may hereafter have better roads.

The establishment of a Department of Agriculture, although provided for by previous legislation, marks an important new departure. This Province is more exclusively devoted to the cultivation of the soil than almost any other in the Dominion and yet was the last to entrust the care and superintendence of the farming industry to a governmental department. The step is undoubtedly in the right direction, but has been too long delayed. In this connection the appointment of a qualified instructor in Agriculture is also to be noted. It might
