S. Benson, commander of the Exmouth, received the distinguished service order for "successful action against the enemy submarines." He was on the bridge of the Exmouth at that time.

### In Sino-Jap War

In August, 1937, Captain Benson figured in the Japanese-Chinese war during the Japanese attack on Shanghai, where he was stationed as commander of the British cruiser Danae.

He appealed unsuccessfully to Japanese Vice Admiral Kiyoshi Hasegawa to move his flagship, the Izumo, from alongside the Japanese consulate-general at the international area on the ground it would induce Chinese bombing of the area.

Against the British sinkings, Germany has admitted the loss of only the 1000-ton pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee, a few submarines and two 400-ton patrol boats. Winston Churchill, First Lord of the British Admiralty, has announced however, that the Nazi sea losses have been much higher, including "half the U-boats."

It was Britain's fifth destroyer sunk since the war began. Fighting Ships Britain had 179 completed destroyers at the outbreak of the war.

The other destroyers lost, besides the Grenville, were the Blanche and the Gypsy, sunk by mines; the Jersey, damaged by torpedo and the Duchess, lost in a collision. The Grenville, like the Exmouth, was said to have been sunk "by mine or torpedo." Another destroyer, the Jersey, was damaged by a torpedo.

### Pound Makes Fresh Advances In U. S. Mart.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23 (CP)—The pound sterling scored fresh advances in terms of the United States dollar in the foreign exchange market today.

Steady added 3-4 cent to \$3.97 1-4 after experiencing a gentle but well-defined forward slant during recent weeks.

Foreign exchange quarters attributed the persistent strength to the determination of Great Britain to take every step necessary to safeguard her war economy from shock.

The Netherlands guilder closed a trifle lower while other major European currencies followed sterling upward. The French franc gained 00 1-2 cent to 225 1-8 and the Belgium Belgas as much. The Swiss franc was unchanged.

The Canadian dollar, at a discount of 11 13-16 per cent was up 1-8 cent.

"We have come here under difficult circumstances to show that we have faith in the one party that stands four-square for democracy in this country," said Dr. MacMillan. "I want to express my personal satisfaction at your actions here today. You have decided in the most democratic way possible what your wishes were whether to contest this election or let it go by default. Those who were opposed to holding an election voted un-animously when it came to the selection of a candidate, showing that the party is united in the essentials."

"I think," continued Dr. MacMillan, "pursued the right course. You have nominated a young man, Mr. John MacLean, the son of a very worthy father with whom I had the pleasure of sitting in the House for many years. During the years when we were in power we had no wiser counsellor in the ranks of our members of the Legislature or of the government than the Hon. H. D. MacLean (Applause)."

Dr. MacMillan also paid warm tribute to Hon. Mr. MacLean's father, the late Senator John MacLean, and said it was a matter for congratulation that a representative of the third generation of a family which had proved to be of such sterling worth and conscience in the administration of public affairs should be the unanimous choice of today's convention.

Briefly touching on federal affairs, Dr. MacMillan said it was significant that the Liberal Premier of the great Province of Ontario should have seen fit to sponsor a vote of condemnation of the King Government with regard to its conduct of Canada's war efforts. He recalled that Premier Hepburn in 1935 had visited Charlottetown and spoken on behalf of Mr. Mackenzie King, whom he regards as incompetent to hold office.

Dr. MacMillan also reviewed briefly the provincial campaign, denouncing the unscrupulous methods used in obtaining Liberal votes.

The electors should be on guard against a repetition of the same tactics in the by-election campaign. While the election of Mr. MacLean would not effect a change in government, his presence in the House would be a constant reminder, whose duty it will be to safeguard the taxpayers' interests and check the unbusiness-like methods which have prevailed since the Campbell Government assumed power.

Dr. MacMillan particularly stressed the serious condition of the finances, the result of Liberal extravagance which if continued for another three or four years will mean that nearly all the revenue of the Province will be required to pay the interest charges on the public debt.

In conclusion, he expressed confidence in Mr. MacLean's ability to carry the constituency with the wholehearted support of the Conservative electors and all who have the real interests of the Province at heart.

The convention closed with the National Anthem.

### Suspend Student Assembly Activities In B. C. College

VANCOUVER, Jan. 23 (CP)—The University of British Columbia students council today suspended all activities of the U. B. C. branch of the Canadian students assembly pending submission by the U. B. C. delegates of a report on the recent C. S. A. conference at St. Anne De Bellevue, Que.

The council announcement said students engaged in C. S. A. activities on the campus will be forbidden to make any official decision or conduct any campaigns.

Delegates from the university who attended the Quebec conference had planned to circulate a questionnaire on conscription among the 2,500 students on the campus.

The students' union of Mount Allison University, Sackville, N. B., last week voted to withdraw from the C. S. A. on grounds that sentiments expressed at the C. S. A. conference were "anti-British and anti-war." Students of the University of Saskatchewan took the same action last week.

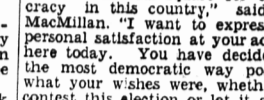
