Geo. Sanderson, Inspector of the Bank of Nova Scotia, Toronto, is in the city on his annual inspector tour. He will be here several weeks.

The following schooners arrived at Montague yesterday to load produce for Nova Scotia markets: Kestrel, Dominion, James Ryan, J. M. B., Jessie A., and Uranis.

There were about 25 passengers and a general cargo of merchandise up West River yesterday afternoon by the S. S. City of London. The return cargo consisted of 17 barrels and 12 cases eggs.

B., the draft gelding Brown that took first prize at the recent Provincial Exhibition, single, and also first as a pair with Buster, another much admired horse at the recent show. Brown was sired by Lucky Jack and was purchased from George Myers, Hampton by Patrick Keenan of this city. Brown weighed when sold 1475 lbs and the price paid by Dr. Woodbury was the highest offered in the city for some years for a cart gelding.

The death occurred in the city yesterday morning of Abraham Van Buskirk, aged 55, son of the late Abraham Van Buskirk of North Rustico. Deceased had been ill for the past four years and had been residing with his niece Mrs. J. H. Hamill since May last, when he arrived from Norwalk, Conn., where he had been living for the past 18 years. He leaves to mourn a sorrowing widow, two brothers Capt. Jacob Van Buskirk and Jonathan Van Buskirk, both of Charlottetown, and one sister Mrs. Daley, of Boston. The deceased was a carpenter and builder, and had been employed chiefly in the United States.

The sudden death occurred last night of John T. Weeks, proprietor of the Windsor Hotel, Pownal street. Mr. Weeks though not feeling very well for some time was about as usual yesterday. Last evening he was stricken with apoplexy and passed away in a short time. The deceased removed to Charlottetown a few months ago from Alberton, where he was universally respected, and opened a hotel on Pownal Street in the old Finlay Hou e where he has since resided. There are 11 to mourn a wife and family to whom the sympathy of many friends will be extended.

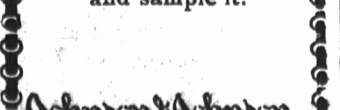
