T. B. Sufferers Benefit by Idea of Danish Clerk

TORONTO, Dec. 23 (C.P.) - History books cite the names of countless persons who have been fitted humanely. Yet few people know of Einar Holboell, Danish postal clerk and originator of the Christmas seal.

He was only one of thousands who delivered mail that winter of 1918. The sufferings of tuberculous children on Copenhagen's streets moved him first to compassion, then to action. The long-term result—today's red seal campaign to fight tuberculosis.

Stamps constantly passed through Holboell's hands, and to him came the thought. Why not add one more penny stamp to the thousands of Christmas letters, a levy on healthy senders, to help alleviate T. B. suffering?

The enthusiasm of his fellow workers caused him to present his plan to the King and Queen of Denmark at the very end of the first sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals in December, 1914. The proceeds established two hospitals for tuberculous children. Einar Holboell's idea took root. In 1917, an American woman, attracted by the Danish Christmas seals appearing on mail to Americans, brought the seal plan to the United States.

Brought To Canada

Dr. William Gage, president of the National Tuberculosis Association, introduced the plan to Canada in 1918 to help maintain Canada's first two hospitals for tuberculous children at Muskoka, Ont., and a third at Weston, Ont.

At the outbreak of war 45 countries were annually selling these seals.

Every such seal, whether its motif be the Danish Queen's face (1904), a wreath of holly (1907) or a little boy (1912—designed by Artist Park Philippe), whether sold in Canada or Europe, displays the same emblem—the double-headed cross, in its patriarchal or religious form, used as a symbol of rank or dignity by the patriarchs of Jerusalem.

The National Sanitarium Association, pioneer organization in Canada to fight T. B., founded in 1884 by a group of philanthropists in Toronto, was intended to be national in scope. But so great was the need in Ontario that its efforts were later concentrated in that province and other associations were organized to cover the rest of Canada.

In 1900 there was but one small sanatorium. Now there are more than 30 sanatoria which treat 12,000 patients annually.

Many Leaders Listed Among 1945's Dead

Leaders in many fields slipped from the Canadian scene in 1945 as death struck at all walks of life.

The judiciary was particularly hard hit, with such prominent jurists lost as Mr. Justice Adjuitor Sargent, Quebec, Mr. Justice G. H. Grimmer of Saint John, N. B., Mr. Justice P. B. Mineault of Montreal, Mr. Justice W. R. Ridgell of Toronto and Mr. Justice G. Crockett of Ottawa.

Hon. N. A. McLarty, former secretary of state in September, was among the most noted political personages in the list. Senator W. A. Griesbach, noted imperialist of Conservative rank at Edmonton, died in January. A. P. McNab, lieutenant-governor of Saskatchewan, in April and Thomas Miller, the Moose Jaw newspaperman who succeeded him, in July.

Among well-known religious figures who died were Rt. Rev. G.A. Bix, Anglican bishop of Caledonia, Bishop A.D.A. Dewdney, retired, and Rev. G. S. Porter of Winnipeg. Bishop F. X. Ross, Roman Catholic bishop of Gaspe, Most Rev. A. O. Tomblin, Roman Catholic bishop of Trois Rivières, Msgr. Cyrille Gagnon, rector of Laval University.

Lt.-Gen. Kenneth Stuart, former chief of staff in Canada, one of the most notable of thousands of Canadian soldiers who died on Europe's battlefields and in Canada.

Other public figures who died included Sen. Frederick Williams, former banker of Montreal, A. E. Phipps of Toronto, former chairman of the Imperial Bank of Canada and Herman Trille, the wheat king, who was slain at San Bernardino, Calif.

Canuck Rendezvous to Close in March

LONDON, Dec. 23 (C.P.) - The Beaver Club, used by some 8,000-10,000 sportsmen since it was opened in February 1940, will close its doors to the services on March 31 next year.

As a compliment to the Canadians, for whom the club was started, the building may be renamed Beaver Building when it is returned to the London County Council. It was formerly the County Hall.

Mr. Vincent Massey, Canadian high commissioner, and Mrs. Massey, attended a farewell party at the Beaver Club given to A. W. Kemball, Montreal, on the retirement as manager, Mrs. Massey in her capacity as honorary president of the Volunteer Helpers, presented the homing message with a set of candlesticks and a set of English hunting prints.

The new manager, E. G. Walling, Scotland, presented him with a silver inkwell set on behalf of the Beaver Club staff.

The Beaver Club will maintain its slogan "Service for the Sportsman" until the doors are closed for the last time. Mr. Walling said, "At the present time it is being used by 10,000 service personnel daily."

The club serves on an average 40,000 meals a week and has a staff of 600 women volunteer helpers. During the war years the number of helpers rose as high as 800.

SUGAR and PRESERVES Combined into ONE RATION PLAN

To simplify Canada's rationing system, only one kind of coupon will be used in 1946 for the purchase of sugar or preserves, with a value of one pound of sugar per coupon, or the new value in preserves shown below.

Table titled '1946 COUPON VALUES' listing items like Canned fruit, Corn, cane and blended table syrup, Honey, Jams, jellies, marmalades, fountain fruits, cranberry sauce, honey butter, Maple Sugar, Maple Syrup, Molasses, and Sugar with their respective coupon values.

There will be no reduction in the present sugar-preserves ration.

Effective January 1, all valid and unused pink sugar coupons will take the new ration values. On January 17, sugar coupons 68 and 69 will be declared valid, and in February the last of these coupons, No. 70, will become good. When pink sugar coupons are exhausted, "S" coupons will be used.

All unused preserves coupons, including "P" coupons, will keep their 1945 value for preserves or sugar and will expire for use by consumers on January 31, 1946.

HOME CANNING: To take care of home canning requirements, 10 separate coupons, good for one pound of sugar each, will become valid during the year on dates to be announced later.
