YORK PATRIOTIC MEETING.—The meeting which was held in York Hall on Monday evening, September 28th, in aid of the Army Field Service Fund and Red Cross Society was largely attended. Dr. J. C. McDonald occupied the chair, and after a few introductory remarks called upon His Honor, Judge Fitzgerald, to address the meeting. The address was exceedingly instructive and gave a comprehensive and interesting review of the present military situation. He paid a glowing tribute to the admirable bravery and heroism displayed by the little Belgian country when its neutrality was scornfully disregarded by the Germans and its rights attacked, and also spoke of the noble hospitality of the English to the Belgians in their distress. His Honor spoke in eloquent terms of the greatness of the British Empire and her unflinching and observance of her obligations of honor.

He referred to the gravity of the struggle and the serious proportion of officers killed to men. Thousands of families in Britain—rich as well as poor—would, he said, be afflicted with deep grief. Canada had not been asked but had voluntarily and spontaneously offered assistance to the Mother Country immediately it became known that the Empire was invaded in the war. In concluding an excellent address, Judge Fitzgerald made a strong, forceful appeal to his audience to do all in their power to support the Empire in the present trying crisis. His Honor, Mr. Justice Hazard, on being called upon, stated that he took the place of Sir Louis Davies who was unavoidably absent in the course of his address. His Honor gave the history of the Red Cross movement from the time of Florence Nightingale up to the present, showing its universal character. He referred with pride to the magnificent collection of clothing which was already at the Armories, and stated that he had no doubt whatever that the Island would lead the Dominion in donations towards the patriotic funds. Addresses by Rev. E. A. Westmoreland, of York, and Rev. F. Coffin, of Dunstaffnage, were ably and interestingly delivered and were notable for their patriotic fervour and the excellence of their style. Miss E. Vessey explained that the ladies of York had associated themselves with the Red Cross Society of Charlottetown and that much work

had already been accomplished. Lists for the Army Field Service and the Red Cross Funds were passed around and were generously supported. After a unanimous vote of thanks to the visiting speakers the meeting closed with the enthusiastic singing of the National Anthem. Mr. W. C. West acted as secretary, discharging the duties in connection with that office in a capable and highly satisfactory manner.
