A VARIETY OF CASUALTIES

Hospital Patient Chokes to Death at Dinner

Lightning Marks a Cross on Wan's Back Rescuer Perishes by Suffocation in Chicago.

PATIENT CHOKES TO DEATH. NEW YORK, Aug. 6. (Special)—Leo Po'd Barman, a patient in the City Hospital, Blackwell Island, choked to death while eating his dinner with many other patients sitting around.

LIGHTNING'S STRANGE RESULT. Abbot Parker who was struck by lightning at Morrystown had a perfect cross five inches long marked on his back.

A CASE OF SUFFOCATION. CHICAGO, Aug. 6. (Special)—Henry Koch fainted and was suffocated by going into an excavation after a policeman who had rescued several men from suffocation.

A BRUTAL EXECUTION.

A brutal execution of a horse took place Saturday forenoon at Brighton shore, near the Range light and to the rear of the residence of George H. Toombs. The unfortunate animal which was owned by a city truckman and had broken its leg on Friday evening was taken to a field near the lighthouse and left all night tied to a horse and suffering from the effects of the accident. Saturday forenoon about eleven o'clock a number of men went to the shore and dug a grave some distance below high water mark to bury the animal after it had been despatched.

The brute hobbling with his broken leg was then led to the brink of the grave and a revolver brought in use to end its existence. After a number of shots had been fired and they were ineffective in pacifying the horse out of pain and were not sufficient to kill the animal an axe was called into requisition. As is usual before such a means is adopted to take an animal's life a covering is put over the head of the brute. This was not done here and the hacking caused by the disabled horse addling the weapon are too brutal to describe. After prolonged work the horse was placed hors de combat, deposited in the hole that had been dug in the sand, and after some stones had been placed upon it was covered with sand and clay by those who had assisted in the execution.

PORT ARTHUR'S FALL REPORTED

But Cannot be True--The Knight Commander Declared a Lawful Prize--Kuropatkin not Likely to Fight at Liao Yang--Believed to be Returning to Mukden.

PORT ARTHUR FALLEN AGAIN. LONDON, August 6 (Special)—Nagasaki sends out a report that Port Arthur has fallen.

THE KNIGHT COMMANDER'S CASE. The prize court at Vladivostok declared the Knight Commander a lawful prize. The ship's papers showed that her cargo consisted of railway material for the military line under construction from Se ul'o Ya'u River.

NO FIGHT AT LIAO YANG. St. Petersburg does not expect General Kuropatkin to give battle at Liao Yang as if afterwards forced to retreat it would involve abandoning all his stores and be as disastrous as a double defeat.

HEAVY FIGHTING GOES ON. All advices of the last few days give accounts of heavy fighting in different parts but give no statement of the losses. [Repeated reports of the fall of Port

Arthur are becoming monotonous. When the stronghold is really captured the world will soon be told of it in an authentic way. The matter is not yet. The decision of the prize court at Vladivostok that the Knight Commander was a lawful prize will not make right the fact that the ship was sunk before the prize court heard of the case. The question is whether commanders of the Russian cruisers may send neutral merchant ship to the bottom at their own pleasure. We shall hear more of this case later. It seems likely enough that Kuropatkin may remove his stores from Liao Yang without fighting a general engagement there and retire to Mukden which is fifty miles further up the line. Such a movement may now be going on in which case the fighting reported within the past few days may be regarded as only intended to retard the Japanese advance until the removal from Liao Yang can be effected.]

DR. MOORE ON TUBERCULOSIS

He Lectures to a Large and Attentive Audience

Consumption has Decreased 50 Per Cent in England in 50 Years —May be Terminated.

The hall at Vernon River Bridge was crowded to the doors to hear Dr. Moore's lecture on tuberculosis. Rev. Father M. Nazhan occupied the chair. The order throughout was excellent; the attention paid to the speaker's remarks was extraordinary.

After giving statistics as to the large number of persons who annually die in this country of this terrible disease the lecturer said that consumption was not confined to the lungs as some people conceive it, but certain other parts of the body are liable to its ravages. Then it is sometimes known under different names; for example dry pleurisy is a tubercular disease and may be classed as consumption in the same manner some forms of arthritis in infants, old sores such as hip joint disease and scrofulous affect on the are in reality tuberculosis.

Tuberculosis is a parasitic disease that it is propagated by means of microscopic animal organisms called germs. These germs are so infinitesimal that on being magnified twelve thousand times they are barely perceptible to the human eye, when so magnified they appear like minute threads of silk. The tubercular germ is thrown off by the lungs and in some cases through sores. In the first case the germs are thrown out in the excretions of the lungs called spina which is simply decayed human tissue. It is estimated that between 2,500,000,000 and 7,000,000,000, the number varying with the state of advancement of the disease of these germs are thrown off every twenty-four hours from the lungs of a person suffering with consumption. Fortunately however all these germs do not live. They have many enemies which retard their growth in the human system. These germs however being persons is very apt to catch disease, while a healthy vigorous and strong system is almost proof against it.

In any use where there is a patient suffering with consumption great care should be taken to see that none of the spuma falls and evaporates on the floor, furniture, etc. If allowed to evaporate the germs are set free and any slight motion of the air in the room such as sweeping sets them in motion. The spuma should be deposited in a basin containing a solution of carbolic and water and afterwards burnt. The germs may also be taken into the human system by eating germ infected food as for example the flesh and milk of cows suffering with the disease. Bovine germs do not seem to be transmitted to the human system. This germs however being weak is more dangerous to infants than to adults. The how are we to fight this dread disease? Proper care of the body, cleanliness and sanitary conditions in our houses and streets, plenty of fresh air and sunlight are the great enemies to the germs. Continuous exposure to the sunlight for eight hours is sufficient to kill any of the germs hence this great need of bright houses and rooms.

A well known English medical journal is responsible for the statement that during the last fifty years thanks to the educated efforts of the people consumption has decreased in that country fifty per cent. If these efforts be kept up for fifty more years consumption in England will be a thing of the past.

At the close of the lecture the lecturer was tendered a vote of thanks to which he feelingly replied.

FOUND DEAD IN BED YESTERDAY

Capt. Maxenr was Suddenly Called Beyond

Had Retired in Good Health on Saturday Night but Never Rose —Wife and Family Left.

A very sudden death took place yesterday at French River in the demise of Capt. Maxenr of Lunenburg, who has been for some months in command of a fishing schooner owned by Capt. James Hugh McLeod of New London.

The deceased who was on the vessel for the first time lived on board the schooner, but on Saturday night came ashore for his washing and stayed at the home of Mrs. Adams where the work was done. Yesterday morning he did not rise and when his room was entered it was found that he was dead. The cause was pronounced to be heart trouble. He had complained of not feeling well during the week but said he was much improved on Saturday. He was fishing in French River Harbor during the day with Capt. Jas. Hugh McLeod and was in good spirits. At the home of Mrs. Adams he ate a hearty supper and was apparently as well as ever during the evening.

Captain Maxenr was well advanced in age being 72 years old. He was in good circumstances as nearly all the Lunenburg fishermen are and leaves a wife and family in Lunenburg. The death was reported to Dr. McNeill of Charlottetown and Dr. Darrich of Kensington yesterday but no inquest was deemed necessary as the cause of death was apparent. The remains will be sent to the home of the deceased in Lunenburg.

BARQUE YUBA SOLD.

DOBRY, August 4.—The hull of the wrecked barque Yuba was brought in yesterday by F. Peterkin, of Yarmouth, for \$816. Sails and other materials, purchased by different persons, brought about \$300. An effort may be made by Lantaul, of St. John, and Peterkin to float the vessel.
