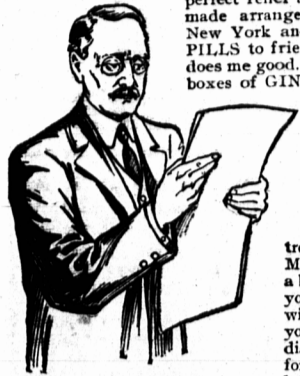

FRIDAY.
BUOY BOAT—Yesterday the Government Buoy boat, the Lady Laurier, arrived here from Halifax for the purpose of picking up and bringing into Charlottetown for security the various heavy buoys around the Island coast which are only used during the mild weather seasons. On her way to Charlottetown she picked up the buoys at East Point, Cape Bear, and Indian Rocks, and she leaves today to remove the buoys at West Point, Point du Chene and in the Summerside fairway.

CAR FERRY—Mr. Frupp, engineer in charge of the Car Ferry pier construction came across by the Empress last night and went to Carleton Point. The tug Gravel, owned by Messrs. Roger Miller & Sons, contractors for the car ferry pier, arrived at Carleton Point yesterday, bringing a considerable part of the plant to be used in construction work. It is the intention of the contractors to have all the plant on the ground this fall in order that work may be pushed at the earliest possible moment after opening of navigation.

THE MINTO—The painting of the exterior of the D. G. S. Minto has been completed and the workmen are now engaged on the interior. The saloons and cabins, in fact, the vessel throughout is being thoroughly cleaned and painted, and the work is likely to be finished by the end of the week. But it will be sometime yet before the Minto will be completely fitted up and prepared for the winter service. The vessel during this week shifted her moorings, going from the west side of the Marine wharf to the east side, and above the Earl Grey this being to make room for the buoy boat, Lady Laurier, and the buoys she is bringing in here.

MANY APPLICANTS—Applications are still coming to the Department of Agriculture for one of the Household Science Courses to be held in P. W. College this winter. It was the intention of the Department to provide for two courses, but as the number of applications coming in was very large, arrangements were made for four, which will occupy the months of January and February. Only 23 can be accepted for each course, the reason being that the Household Science room at P. W. College will only accommodate this number. As these are all the courses that can be arranged for this winter, the Department is not in a position to accept further applications.

FARMERS ORGANIZE—The farmers in the vicinity of Poplar Point and Cumberland Hill met in the Cumberland Hill School House on Saturday evening, Nov. 15th, for the purpose of forming a farmer's association. Mr. John B. Campbell was called upon to preside and in a few well chosen words explained the object of the meeting. All present were enthusiastic to have an association formed, not only to take advantage of the Government distributions of pure bred animals but to further the interests of the farmer in general. The association is to be known as the "Cumberland Hill Farmer's Association." Following officers were elected:—J. B. Campbell, President; J. R. Jenkins—Vice President; Duncan—Secy and Treas; Directors: L. P. Wood, J. R. Campbell, Freeman Martin, Dan Nicholson. Cumberland Hill farmers are to be congratulated in the forward step they have taken and no doubt in the near future will be able to dispose of their surplus gilt-edge stock to good advantage.

P. E. I. SANATORIUM—All likelihood of a start being made this season with the building of the sanatorium for the treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis which is to be erected in this province through the munificence of the Hon. Charles Dalton may be discarded, as it is now evident that this is not possible. This comes about through the delay of the architects in forwarding the specifications for the work according to the plans which were submitted and which were accepted by the Sanatorium Committee with a few changes. The specifications have not yet, as a matter of fact, been received by the Committee; the contractors excusing themselves on the ground of pressure of work. If this delay had not occurred, it is very probable that the work of erecting the building could have been commenced already, and certainly the foundations would have been finished this year. As it is now, a Guardian representative learned from Dr. S. R. Jenkins, the chairman of the Committee, the construction of the sanatorium will be started early next spring, and it is expected that the institution will be ready to receive its first patients by the winter of the same year.

TABLET UNVEILED—The Nova Scotia Historical Society on Monday unveiled a tablet to the memory of Colonel J. F. W. DesBarres in the north aisle of St. George's Church, Halifax, immediately above the tomb of the chief. The Memorial is a very handsome one of aluminum. The President of the Society, Venerable Archdeacon Armitage presided. The ceremony was simple and impressive. The archdeacon outlined the achievements of the interesting man who had been one time Governor of Cape Breton and subsequently Lt. Governor of P. E. Island. The address by Mr. James S. McDonald was graphic and illuminating, dealing with the versatile and important part Governor DesBarres had taken in the history of our country. The inscription on the tablet which gives a fair idea for the reading works he was engaged in and he services he gave to humanity, is as follows:—"This Tablet Commemorates Col. Joseph Frederick Walle DesBarres, Cartographer, Engineer, Administrator, who lived in this Garrison as Captain of the Royal American Regiment of Foot, 1756; won distinction at Louisbourg, 1758; Aide de Camp to General Wolfe at Quebec, 1759; Surveyor General of the North Atlantic Coast Preceptor of Captain Cook, the Circumnavigator; Author of the Atlantic Neptune; Founder of Sydney, C. B., Lt. Governor of Cape Breton and of Prince Edward Island. Buried beneath this Church Nov. 1st, 1824, at the reputed age of 103 years." The Nova Scotia Historical Society.

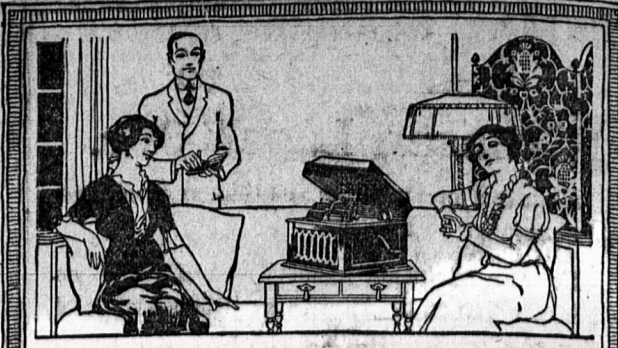
The Canadian Home Investment Company, (with headquarters in Vancouver, B. C.), in which it is estimated between three and four hundred persons in this province hold contracts, was last week bought over by the Alpha Mortgage and Investment Corporation. Following the transaction, the Toronto Saturday Night published an article in which it made several denunciations of startling statements about the transaction, affirming the ruin of the contract holders. Impelled by that article a number of contract holders in the city interviewed the Attorney-General, who on the representations made to him, directed the company's local manager, Mr. G. R. Beer, not to receive further payments on behalf of the company, and in consequence Mr. Beer sent a telegram to the company's head office in Vancouver actuating his principals of the local situation. In reply he received the following telegraphic message:—"All holdings of C.H.I.C. purchased by the Alpha Mortgage and Investment Corporation on Friday last. Entirely new and very strong board of directors. Old company's business in fine shape. Loan or reserve fund intact. Fullset protection to contract holders; now better secured than ever before. Newspaper announcement mailed Saturday. Letter follows..." The Alpha Mortgage and Investment Corp. T. Bradley Taylor, Sec."

Not satisfied with this assurance from the new company, a number of the contract-holders at the instance of Mr. P. Smith met in the Board of Trade rooms last night to consider the situation and what steps they should take. Mr. Smith presided, and Mr. Ross McEwen was appointed secretary. Among those present were Messrs. J. E. B. McCreedy, W. W. Clarke and Frank Stewart. The chairman suggested the ap-

pointment of a strong committee to interview a lawyer and ascertain what legal action could be taken to protect the local contract-holders. In this connection he deplored the fact that they had no public prosecutor in this province; "had there been one we could have got after him and have saved a lot of poor people their money."

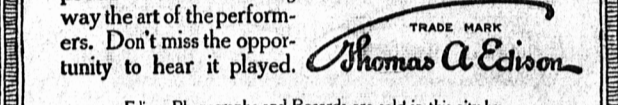
Other speakers, however, were not so drastic in their views. The consensus of the expressed opinion was that the contract-holders had not sufficient data to take any action upon, and the opinion was expressed in some quarters that there might be nothing to cause dissatisfaction after all. One speaker said that as far as his dealings with the original company went, he had found them honest in everything. Another speaker pointed out that the purchase of the company must have been conducted on some basis, and that until they had details as to what that basis was, there was no necessity for action on their part, as when those details were obtained there might be cause for gratification instead of indignation. The feeling of the meeting, however, was that an effort should be made immediately to get all available information as to the transaction, and on the motion of Mr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. Brown, a motion was carried to appoint a committee to interview the Premier and request him to communicate with the Government of British Columbia and obtain all the information possible as to the buying over of the Canadian Home Investment Company by the Alpha Mortgage and Investment Corporation, and as to the bona fides of the transaction, and the standing of the new company and of the original contract-holders. The Committee appointed for this purpose were Messrs. H. Fitzgerald, P. Smith and W. Hoger. The meeting thereafter adjourned.
