May Ask For Membership in League of Nations

(Associated Press.) GENEVA, Aug. 24.—The reparations problem and the question whether Germany is to be admitted to membership in the League of Nations are two matters, in the opinion of League authorities, that probably will come up at the meeting of League assembly which opens in this city Monday, September 30.

In this connection an English delegate said recently: "I don't see how it will be possible to keep the reparations problem out of the discussion, unless it be settled beforehand." And another delegate from one of the northern Scandinavian lands, referring to the popular movement in Germany to apply for membership, said: "Certainly Germany should come in. If she applies she would probably be elected easily."

These and other questions, like the problem of only usually dividing itself into six general committees. These include constitutional and legal questions, such as amendments to the covenant of the league; the work of the technical organizations on economics, finance, transit and health; the question of reduction of armaments; the budget and other matters of internal administration; social questions, such as opium, the white slave traffic and refugee problems, and political questions such as the admission of new states.

These committees are virtually small assemblies in themselves, for each country has the right to be represented on all of them. As three committees sit simultaneously one day and three others the next, the work of the assembly is greatly expedited. Newspaper correspondents are kept busy following all these meetings. When the committees make their final reports, usually brief, the final assembly affords a final debate on any point still at issue.

The official languages of the assembly are French and English. Speeches delivered in one are translated into the other tongue. The assembly convention lasts from three to four weeks and generally marks out broad policies whose detailed execution is left to the council, which is the cabinet of the League of Nations.

In view of the late President Harding's recommendation that the United States join the International Court of Justice, of special interest to Americans will be the election of a successor to Judge Ruy Barbosa of Brazil as a member of the court. This election is carried out by the concurrent majority action of the assembly and council. The American group of the old Hague arbitral court exercised its prerogative this year, and nominated a candidate to succeed Judge Barbosa.

HOUSE OF LORDS FEARS FOR WEST INDIAN COLONIES

(Associated Press.) LONDON, Aug. 24.—Fear that American influences may eventually affect the relations between England and the British West Indies has invaded Parliament and caused some members of the House of Lords to urge that the government lose no time in strengthening the existing bonds with the British colonies.

Viccount Burnham has urged that special representation at the Imperial Economic Conference be given the West Indies, and that better communication on the sea and under it be established at once with the part of the Empire the points out that communication at the present time is very bad, a condition that does not admit with any other part of the Empire. Almost all of the news supplied to the West Indian papers comes from America, and reflects the American point of view.

TURKS APPROVE GOLD TEETH

(Associated Press.) CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 24.—The religious court of Constantinople has decided that it is not against the Mussulman religion for adherents to cover their teeth with gold or other metals.

Famous Horse Thief Taken

(By Dominion News Service) LONDON, Aug. 24.—Kalu—horse-thief, robber raider and murderer—a character who might have stepped straight out of the pages of "Kim"—has finished his long feud with the forces of law and order at last, and lies safely in jail in the Kohat district waiting for the reckoning.

For eight years Kalu has been the terror of the hills, raiding and plundering from Isa Khel to Dera Isat, and leading his bandits down from his refuge in the Mahsud country to loot the surrounding villages on the plains. From the beginning it has been very certain that the Evil One was looking after his own; Kalu has been wounded more than once in engagements with pursuing parties escaped and escaped capture half a hundred times over by the narrowest shave possible. He defied law and order. He danced tantalizingly in front of his representatives like a copper-colored Will o' the Wisp, and the very mention of his name was enough to set authority swearing from Shikhi Budin to the Marawat Plain.

His last exploit a worthy finale to a long and shameless career, was the raiding of Kundian on the east bank of the Indus. This apparently was a little too much for his caution and he became too reckless. The police captured him and three of his men at the end of a running fight which might have been an unwritten verse of "The Ballad of East and West" and authority all over the North-West Frontier is jubilant.
