S'Side Firm Sells Machinery To Harmon Field

The Hall Manufacturing and Cold Storage Co. Ltd. of Summerside, manufacturers of all kinds of farm implements and local representatives of Allis Chalmers Tractor Co. Ltd., completed a sale several days ago to the American Government of one Allis Chalmers B tractor and one one-hundred-gallon four-wheel power sprayer to be used at the U.S.A.F. base, Harmon Field, at Steveston, Newfoundland. The machines were shipped direct to Harmon Field from the local airport where they were picked up by a U.S.A.F. aircraft, a Fairchild flying box car. Mr. George Key, managing director of Hall's, said yesterday that this was the second shipment of farm machinery to Harmon Field, which is an excellent indication of the quality of machinery manufactured and distributed by this firm. The Fairchild plane which took back the machinery to Harmon Field also carried on the return trip a cargo of milk from the Ideal Dairy. For a number of years now planes from this base have been making regular trips to Summerside for fresh pasteurized milk and considerable other business is done in Summerside as well. This huge plane has a carrying capacity of 18,000 pounds.

Passage Of Bill Is Opposed In House

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 9 - (CP) - A bill that would eliminate the possibility of filibuster received opposition today in the Newfoundland legislature. The bill, which would regulate procedure in the house, was opposed by Opposition Leader John G. Higgins on the ground that it might interfere with free speech.

It would enable the House to establish a time limit on speeches a regulation at present in effect in the Canadian House of Commons. Premier Smallwood, speaking in committee of the whole house, said there was little likelihood such a regulation would be abused but would eliminate any danger of "endless obstruction."

He referred to Newfoundland's committee of the whole house, said there was no such restriction and members sometimes talked for nearly a week. Similar tactics sometimes were employed in the United States legislative bodies. The legislation, which adjourned until Thursday, passed the bill through committee on a split vote and it will come up for second reading at the next sitting.
