Navy Ships Back in Canada



Four more Royal Canadian Navy ships arrived in Halifax Thursday night and Friday from service in the Atlantic and European waters, part of the general movement of navy ships back to Canada following the end of war in Europe. Two corvettes, H.M.C.S. Drumheller and H. M. C. S. Kitchener had been in European waters for more than a year, while the frigate H.M.C.S. Longwell and the Castle corvette H.M.C.S. Kincardine had served nearly a year in mid-ocean convoy escort.

Now In Canada



With the Atlantic again a non-combat area, scores of Royal Canadian Navy ships which have been serving in the European area are returning to Canada. A group of four veteran River-class destroyer H. M. C. Ships Assiniboine, Saskatchewan, Kootenay and Gatineau arrived in Halifax this week bringing their crews and hundreds of naval personnel from the United Kingdom home for Pacific leave or for new assignments.
