Arrows Stay In Title Hunt; Beat Yards 7-5

HALIFAX, Sept. 3 — (CP) — Halifax Arrows kept themselves in the hunt for the Halifax and district Senior Baseball League title tonight by downing Shipyard's 7-5 in the sixth game of their final series. Yards lead 3-2 with one game tied. Seventh game will be played tomorrow.

Battle Over Olympic Hockey Is Expected

ZURICH, Switzerland, Sept. 3 — (CP) — A decisive battle over Olympic hockey between Avery Brundage, chairman of the United States Olympic Committee, and the International Ice Hockey Federation is expected to break out when the Federation meets Sept. 5-9.

The dispute could possibly eliminate hockey from the Olympic winter games scheduled for St. Moritz in February.

Brundage set the stage for the battle in a letter dated July 26 from his Chicago headquarters. It went to all members of the International Olympic Committee, including Sidney Dawes of Montreal, the Canadian member.

In an obvious reference to the American Hockey Association, which replaced the Amateur Athletic Union as the United States member of the I. I. H. F. and was recognized as controlling body for amateur hockey in that country by a 9-10-2 vote at Prague last February, Brundage said:

"The association which was taken into membership by the I. I. H. F. by very irregular methods is an outlaw organization sponsored by commercial interests for money-making purposes that is not recognized, and never will be recognized, by the United States Olympic Committee or any of the other amateur organizations in this country."

Meanwhile it is reported on a reliable authority that if the A. H. A. entry is vetoed by the International Olympic Committee after the I. I. H. F. is satisfied it is a bona fide amateur organization, all countries affiliated with the I. I. H. F., including Canada, will withdraw from the winter games.

Instead, the I. I. H. F. would sponsor world and European championships in Switzerland in February.

A's Rookie Hurler Pitches No-hitter Against Senators

Right-hander Bill McCahan, Philadelphia Athletics rookie, faced only 28 men one more than absolutely necessary — to hurl a 3-0, no-hit, no-run triumph over Washington Senators yesterday.

It was the third no-hitter in the majors this season, second in the American League — and the 131st similar hurling feat achieved since records first were compiled in 1875.

The 25-year-old McCahan missed a perfect game by a mere flick of the bat in the seventh inning, when he was replaced by pitcher Rube Bressler. McCahan, who came up to the A's last year after a good season with Toronto Maple Leafs of the International League, where he won 11 and lost seven, was never in serious trouble, but a few times he had to thank the slick fielding of his teammates for beautiful saves.

Don Black of Cleveland Indians tossed the other American League no-hitter this year, July 10, evidently against the Athletics. In the National, Ewell Blackwell of Cincinnati Reds held Boston Braves hitless June 18.

The A's scored one run in the second inning after pitcher Rae Scarborough walked Fain and Ed Majeski and then gave up a single to hard-hitting Sam Chapman. Two singles, a walk and a double by Valo produced two more Philadelphia runs in the seventh to sew up the contest for McCahan.

At Boston, blasting Boston for a total of 34 hits, New York Yankees swept both ends of a double-header, 11-2, and 9-6, snapping the Red Sox winning streak at seven straight by hosting their own league lead to 12-1-2 games.

South Africa In Tie With Sussex

LONDON, Sept. 2 — (Reuters) — South Africa's game against Sussex today tailed off to a tame tie after they had declared, at their overnight score of 555 six wickets. After the match the tourists left for Hastings to start their final first-class match against a strong south of England side.

Denis Compton, England and Middlesex ace bat, scored his 16th century of the season to equal the record scored in 1925 by Jack Hobbs, former England and Surrey opening batsman. Despite this, the champion county were defeated by Lancashire.

Williams Has Nine Point Lead

CHICAGO, Sept. 1 — (AP)—Ted Williams, Boston's slugging outfielder, inched farther ahead of Dale Mitchell of Cleveland last week in the race for the American League batting championship. Williams, out for his first batting title since 1942, took a lead of nine percentage points over Mitchell, 340 to 331. A week ago Williams was seven points in the lead.

The Boston cleanup batter also led three specially designated-most runs with 103; most runs batted in with 89 and most runs, 27.

Lou Boudreau, Cleveland shortstop and manager, climbed back into third place among the leading hitters through games of Sunday, Aug. 31, thanks to drops in averages of Barney McCosky of Philadelphia and Luke Appling of Chicago. A week ago Appling and Boudreau were tied for fourth at 327, a point behind McCosky.

The compilation showed Boudreau third with 325; George Kell of Detroit, fourth, 320; Appling, Taft Wright of Chicago and Joe DiMaggio of New York tied for fifth with 315 and Johnny Pesky of Boston in 8th with 314. A point behind was McCosky and in 10th place was Bob Dillinger of St. Louis with 298.

Pesky led in the number of hits, 162; Boudreau had the most doubles, 42, and Mickey Vernon of Washington the most triples, 11. Dillinger had 29 stolen bases.

Frank Shea of New York kept atop the pitching list with 11 win, four lost record while Bob Feller of Cleveland added six more strikeouts during the week to raise his leading count to 160.
