Scm Alma L. Geste, Capt. McCarthy, cleared yesterday from Souris for Glace Bay with 1400 bus potatoes, 200 bus turnips.

Capt. Dick has arrived in Souris from Georgetown, with his schooner, and intends loading potatoes for Halifax. Souris harbor is clear of ice.

J. W. CARUTHERS and wife of Montague who have been spending a bel. stay at O'Leary, returned to Montague by the express last night.

Miss Edith Cox, who has been spending a holiday with her parents R. N. and Mrs Cox, Morell was a passenger by the express last night, returning to Boston.

The schr. Parthenia, Capl. Rhude, has cleared from Souris for Port Hawkesbury with 500 bush, potatoes, 300 bush, oats, 100 bush, turnips and 9000 ft plank.

David C. Mellish arrived at his home in Montague on New Year's Day, from Pipestone, Manitoba, where he has spent the last four and a half years. He is doing well and is a favorite in the West as he was in Montague.

What is thought to be the wreckage of a sailing vessel has been discovered off Panmure Island near Georgetown. In seven fathoms of water the mast of a vessel projects above the surface and it is supposed the hull to which it belongs is lying on the bottom.

At a meeting of the Bangor Farmer's Club held on the 29th inst, it was unanimously resolved that the farmers belonging to this club will not grow potatoes for the manufacture of starch for less than thirty cents per hundred pounds. Alex Ladner, Sec.

The whole cargo is for the Magdalen Island Fishing and Developing Co. The Harlow also carries the mails to the Islands this trip.

A young gentleman from the vicinity of Montague had the annoyance of mislaid his wallet, containing a sum of money, on the train between Montague and Georgetown on Monday. Luckily it fell into the hands of Conductor Hibbet who sought out the young man. The letter was happy and thankful to receive the wallet back again.

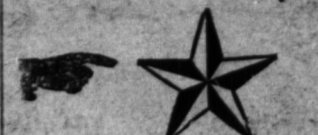
