HUSBANDS LOVE HARDER BUT WIVES LOVE LONGER

After Marriage A Change Comes In The Mental Make-Up Of Most Men And Women

A group of girls ask me which love the more husbands or wives? This is a question that cannot be answered definitely because in marriage there are no general rules. There are only exceptions. Every marriage is an individual case and whether the husband loves more or the wife depends upon which one is the more emotional, the more sensitive and has the deeper craving for affection. Sometimes it is the husband who kisses and the wife who turns her cheek. Sometimes it is the wife who kisses and the husband who turns his cheek. Speaking by and large, however, I would say that, as a rule, husbands love more at the beginning of marriage than wives do. Very few men ever marry for anything except love. They know that marriage is the end of their freedom and the beginning of a life sentence at hard labor to support a man and children. They do not have any material benefit to gain from marriage, and they see that the wife will not be any more than a burden to them. They marry chiefly because they are in love, of course, but besides that they marry because they are tired of punching the time clock in some store or office and want husbands to support them and keep from being old maids. THE COOK'S CORNER

LIGHT SUITANA CAKE

1 cup butter
1-2 cups brown sugar
3 eggs
2-1/2 cups flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1-2 teaspoon salt
3-4 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 pound bleached suiltana
1-2 cup chopped mixed peel
1-2 cup cherries

Method: Cream the butter thoroughly and gradually cream in the brown sugar that has been measured packed down well into the cup. Add one egg at a time to the creamed mixture, beating the mixture until light and fluffy after each addition.

Sift flour, then measure 2-1/2 cups of this, and sift again with the baking powder and salt. Add the milk to the chopped mixed peel and the vanilla has been added.

Wash the raisins in warm water, then dry thoroughly between towels. Chop over the fruit until the fruit is well coated. Add to the cake batter, stirring until well blended.

Line cake pan with two or three thicknesses of wax paper, or with brown paper which has been well greased. Fill with the cake batter and bake in a moderately slow oven (325 deg. F.) for about 1-1/2 to 2 hours. Test before removing from the oven.

Remove the cake from the pan when baked and let become thoroughly cool on a cake rack. Now wrap in several thicknesses of wax paper and store in a covered tin. This cake is better if left to ripen for a week or so before being cut.

SAND CAKE

2-3 cup cornstarch, 2-3 cup self-raising flour or 2-3 cup plain flour, 1-2 level tps. baking powder, 2 eggs, 1 tsp. very finely shaved fruit peel, 1-2 cup shortening, 1 cup sugar, about 2 dessertspoons milk.

Sift flour with cornstarch. Beat the sugar and fat to a very soft cream, then beat in the eggs adding them separately. When both are well beaten in stir in the shavings of fruit peel. Add the flour and cornstarch gradually, stirring in the milk to moisten. Mix all together lightly, then turn into a greased loaf tin and fill to hollow out the centre. Put in moderate oven to bake for 1 hour. Test with fine skewer before removing from oven. When cold, sprinkle icing sugar over top of cake.

SCREEN STORAGE IMPORTANT

Damage to the wire cloth of screens as well as warping of the frames may be caused by improper storage and protection of screens during the winter months.

In order that they may not warp, screens should be stored either standing up in racks or lying down flat. It is important, if the screens are stacked, that the surface on which they are stacked be level and that each screen be placed squarely and firmly on the one below it.

If screens and window sills have not already been numbered, this is recommended, so that when the screens are put into use in the spring they may be easily sorted and fitted to their proper places. It may be wiser to replace screens which are in need of too many repairs.

ECONOMY SOUP

Save the water from the vegetables that you have boiled, mix them together, add a lump of butter, heat and thicken with a lightly beaten egg (one egg to one pint of liquid). Season with salt and pepper, serve garnished with chopped chives or parsley.


