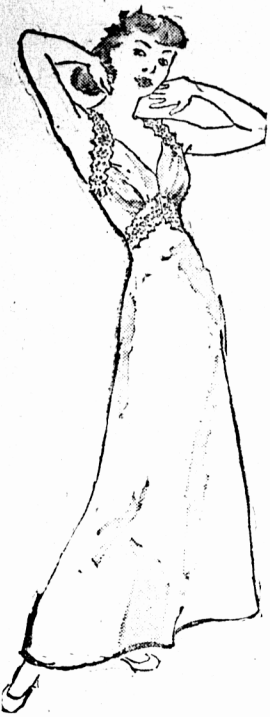

In Memoriam

MR. J. MARCHBANK WEBSTER

—After an illness of a few months one of Central Bedeque's most worthy citizens, Mr. J. Marchbank Webster, passed away at the home of his son, Vernon, of Middleton on July 15. Although he had been in failing health for some time, his sudden passing came as a shock to his family. He was a prosperous farmer and moved to Bedeque from Norborne in his early manhood. By his honest dealing and hard labor he settled his three sons on farms near together. He was a man of sterling character and his many friends always received a royal welcome at his home. He was a member of the United Church and while his health permitted was a very regular attendant. He was a staunch Liberal in politics and was interested in community welfare. He was twice married, his first wife being Anna Ellis by whom the following sons and daughters are left to mourn a loving father; (Irene) Mrs. Hudson Lowther, Carleton; (Bea-

trice) Mrs. Cyril McFarlane, Fernwood; Ellis and Lloyd in Central Bedeque, Vernon in Middleton with whom he resided, (Ema) Mrs. William Mills of Summerside and twelve grandchildren and two great grandchildren. His second wife was Elizabeth Leard who also predeceased him five years ago. Two of his brothers, Joseph and Harry who are located in Imperial, Sask., who had not been home for thirty and thirty-seven years respectively, hurried home to be at his bedside but arrived one day too late to see him alive. However they were able to be present at the funeral. Another brother Alonzo on the homestead at Norborne who is visiting in Vancouver, B.C. and a sister, (May) Mrs. Hugh Gillis, Edmonton, Alta. survive him. His funeral was held from his home on Saturday and was very largely attended and conducted by his pastor, Rev. Burton Crowe assisted by Rev. Charles Britten who gave the address and took as his text Chapter 4 Mark and 36th verse "And when even was come he saith unto them, let us pass over on the other side" and spoke words of comfort to the bereaved. Hymns sung were "The Lords My Shepherd", "Forever With the Lord" and "Safe in the Arms of Jesus". Pallbearers were Messrs. Edision Wright, John H. Dawson, T.J. Inman, Edwin Lord, Harold Bagwell, Howard Schurman.
