NOVA SCOTIA EGG LAYING CONTEST, EXPERIMENTAL FARM, NAPPA, N. S.

At the close of the fifth period on March 26th, the Nova Scotia contest birds have laid a total of 18,186 eggs, scoring 18,228.7 points since the 1st of November, 1932.

The leading pen is Mr. A. T. Reed's Barred Rocks from Rollingdam, N. B., with 910 eggs and 966.9 points. Mr. W. J. White's barred rocks from Moore's Mills, N. B., are second, with 795 eggs and 935.7 points. Mr. W. H. McGibbon's barred rocks from Moore's Mills, N. B.,

are third, with 800 eggs and 877.1 points.

The highest individual to date from November 1st is Barred Rock No. 419 in Mr. McGibbon's pen, with 112 eggs and 130.4 points, while Mr. A. T. Reed's Barred Rock No. 36 is second, with 101 eggs and 122.0 points. The third bird is Mr. J. Robertson's Barred Rock from Salsprings, Pictou, N. S., with 112 eggs and 119.5 points.

—UNUSUAL NUMBER OF SEALS—From reports from Campbellton in the western part of the Island there are thousands of seals on the ice along the shore from Campbellton to Miminigash. This is most unusual. Every year a few seals are seen in this locality but never within the memory of the oldest inhabitant have they

been seen in such large quantities. They are of various colours, black, brown, grey and spotted. There are hundreds of young ones, which are white in colour, these remain on top of the ice all the time until they lose their first coat and turn colour. They appear to eat nothing but ice. After they change their coat they join the older seals, who sport on the ice cakes and dive under the water. When they first made their appearance the people chased them and many were captured and killed. Others were kept as pets. But now not much notice is taken of them. Recently four young men nearly lost their lives hunting the seals, but were rescued by Ingham Costan and others, who went out in a dory some seven miles where they were marooned on ice cakes, which had broken away from the main ice. It is reported that inquiries are being made from Newfoundland as to the number of seals in Island waters, which might result in sealing vessels making a trip to the west shore with a view of capturing them for their oil and skins.—S

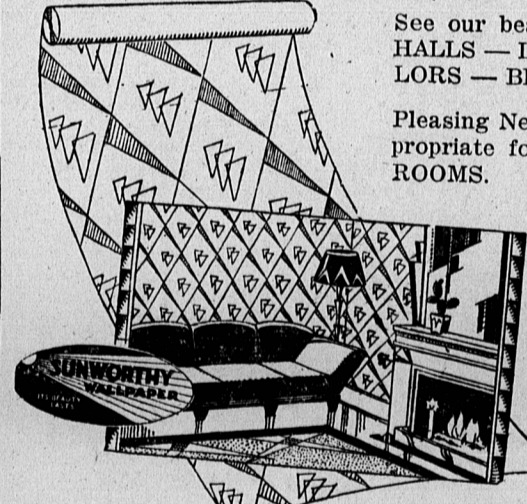
—Miss Geraldine Shea, teacher of Derby School spent the week end at her home in Indian River.—K
