The park and school systems, the bright lights of Broadway, the various public buildings, etc., were also touched upon. The recent presidential elections, depression, Communism, Prohibition and other matters were discussed by the speaker.

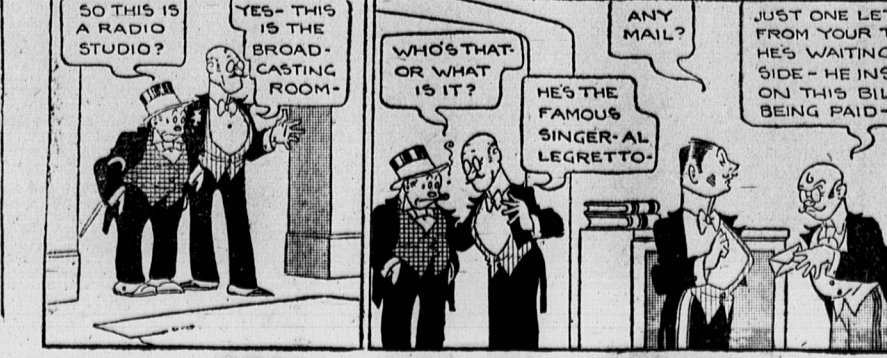

Advertisement for Hog Quality Improves. A report prepared by the Sheep and Swine Division of the Dominion Department of Agriculture states: "Hog grading statistics show an increase of 41,759 select bacon hogs as produced during the calendar year 1931. Hogs as marketed throughout the Dominion showed considerable improvement over any previous year. Not only was there an increase in the number of select bacon hogs produced, but there was in addition an increase in bacon hogs and a lower percentage of butchers. The butcher grade, as graded, showed the refining influence of bacon breeding in a large percentage of the hogs. The average weight of all hogs was approximately four pounds heavier than the previous year. The percentage of lights was reduced time in new areas, and approximately 321,427 cattle have been tested in areas previously established.-Dominion Department of Agriculture.
