The recent arrest and conviction of eight offenders against the bylaw for all who stand on street corners or otherwise obstruct public walks by pedestrians evidences the vigilance of the police. The week previous to their arrest people were commencing to comment on the frequency with which parties were hanging around certain corners some of whom were in a semi-intoxicated condition. Charlottetown is pretty free from annoyances from that most undesirable citizen, the habitual loafer and this is in a great measure due to the effective work of the bluecoats who have been instructed to particularly watch for corner loafers and who intend to continue the campaign from now on. The warm spring evenings are here and the time is approaching when loafers are most in evidence, but with a few examples now and then the nuisance can be effectually combated.

A letter which will be of much interest in this Province, among agriculturists especially has been issued by Geo. H. Clark, Seed Commissioner, Ottawa. He writes respecting the mangel seed which, this year, he says is low in vitality and will need to be sown more plentifully this season. He goes on to say:—"There is no need for any farmer to reduce the area intended for planting to mangels and he will suffer no danger from crop failure providing that he will take the trouble to determine the percentage of seed balls capable of germinating and increase the amount of seed sown accordingly. In most cases it will be found that at least one-half more mangel seed than usual will have to be sown this year to secure a reasonably good stand of plants. Farmers should give the preference to mangel seeds put up by reliable firms and not hesitate to procure seeds of their favorite varieties from bags or packages on which the percentage of vitality is branded, even though that percentage would seem to be rather low."

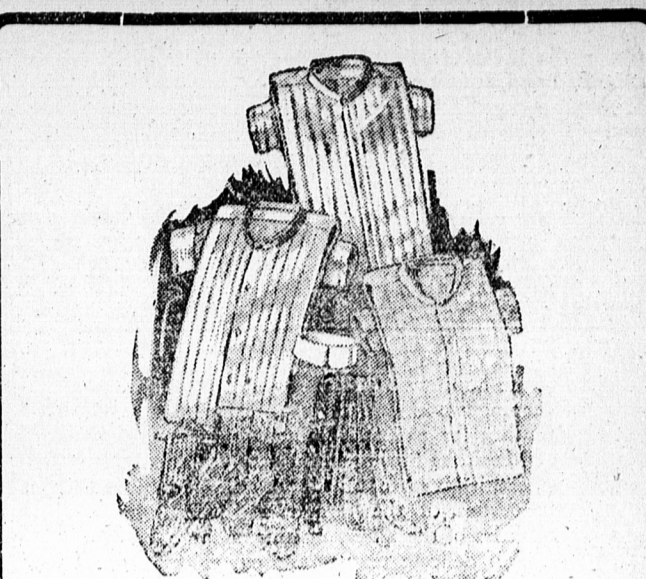
NEW YORK HIPPODROME.
