**Texas Canadian Gaining In U.S. Field**

Texas-Canadian Oil Corporation is one of those organizations which make interesting watching from the angle of those who like to see how Canadian capital and Canadian enterprise make out when they invade a foreign field and go up against all the competition which that implies, particularly in entering the United States. It was only a few years ago that P. D. Bowlen now President and Managing Director of Texas-Canadian, a former Islander, stepped into the East Texas oil field, with little more backing than a determination to win and with experience gained in the Wainwright field in Alberta. The latter field provided plenty of experience, but little success. Now, approximately seven years from the time Mr. Bowlen went to East Texas, the Texas-Canadian Oil Corporation has turned in a report showing earnings of \$409,437 for the fiscal year ending April 30, or 18 1/2 cents a share on the 2,200,000 shares outstanding.

In the process of developing holdings in the East Texas field, Mr. Bowlen has gotten around him such prominent Canadians as Major-General D. M. Hogarth, Duncan McLaren, Senator J. D. McRae, Hon. W. H. Sharpe of Winnipeg, John R. Shaw of Woodstock, and H. M. Snyder of Waterloo. All are on the board, and all approved of the story of progress which the Canadian organization has made in the highly competitive oil industry in the highly competitive United States.

Progress is outlined by the fact that the net profits of \$409,437 for the fiscal year ending April 30 compared with \$171,192 for the previous fiscal period. At the close of business on April 30, 1936, the corporation had 137 producing wells, gain of 52 during the year, or 61 per cent. The organization's average ownership in the 137 wells is 81 per cent, after allowing for royalties, working interests and other factors.

As for oil reserves, an estimate appearing in the annual statement and sponsored by Carillon Meredith, petroleum engineer and geologist of Dallas, Texas, states that, after deducting royalties, etc., potential oil reserves increased to 24,099,000 barrels from 11,658,928 on April 30, 1936. This was 107 per cent.

With the exception of two or three offset wells which it may be necessary to drill later, Texas-Canadian has completed its active development in the East Texas field, but has a 51 per cent interest in the Texas-Canadian Development Company which has acquired leases on thousands of acres in South Texas and other areas. The arrangement is such that there is no cost to Texas-Canadian in the activities of the development company; and the declared objective is to go out and see if it is possible to bring in a wild-cat field. One of the year's experiments in the wild-cat line consisted of selling its holdings at a profit of \$95,000.
