ber the splendid armies of France the invasion of the Fatherland, the defence of German soil against a hated enemy supply the strongest possible motives to armed resistance. Only a leader is wanted. Few would be surprised if in a month or two hence the German nation were again in arms for home defence and France had again raised the cry of "On to Berlin" as it was raised in 1870. But with a strong sense of present imminent danger we must all hope that the threatening war clouds now so dark over the Rhine and the Balkans will pass away. However, we cannot hope that wars have ceased. We are still in the age of "wars and rumors of wars."

The German mark has reached a new low record, the result of the French occupation of the Ruhr valley. Before the war the mark was approximately equal to the English shilling in value 24 cents in Canadian currency. Now it is quoted in New York at sixty one hundredths or three-fifths of a cent. Thanks to the brave men who won the war, the Canadian dollar is still worth its face while the mark, outside of Germany, is worth no more than the paper on which it is printed.

It seems strange that after the last snow storm the narrow gauge tracks of our railway should be the first to be made passable for trains. This comes of the fact that we have the standard gauge only in the central portion of the province, which includes our hill country, where of necessity the railway cuttings are deepest, most numerous and most obstructed by drifts. Unless we soon have a thaw and should other snowstorms come on top of those we have had, the snow problem will be a serious one.

Turkeys From Hungary

For the first time, as a result of the initiative and activities of certain Canadian export agents in London, Hungarian turkeys are being introduced to the Canadian public this winter. One hundred thousand pounds of them arrived at Montreal shortly before Christmas, from which point offerings were made to the wholesale trade throughout Ontario. Last year Hungarian turkeys, in comparative small quantities, found a ready market in the United States.

FARMING FISH.

Owing to the increased demand in the fish market for plaice, British travelers are extending the field of their operations to the waters about Iceland and to the White Sea. The plaice is known for service to a considerable age, and in these fresher fishing grounds the fisherman are finding large numbers of thirty-two to thirty-five year old fish. Out of every 10,000 caught, at least 2,000 are more than fifty years of age. One old fellow was thirty-two! The fish of the North Sea are for the most part much younger, fat, and under thirty. Experts who tell the age of the plaice do so by the ear-ribs and a bone of the gill cover, scale, and are learning how many principles as the shepherd practice of plaice farming on a large scale, the best results, on the same his flock.
