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FUCHS RESIGNS FROM BOSTON BRAVES CLUB

(By Bill King, Associated Press Sports Writer) BOSTON, July 31—Emil Fuchs, President of Boston Braves since 1925, today forfeited his majority stock holdings to Charles F. Adams, his vice-president, and resigned from the club.

Fuchs announced his retirement as club president today but Adams will not take actual possession until tomorrow when Bill McKeech, who has managed the Braves since 1930, will be installed as pro tem head of the last place club.

Although Fuchs' financial reverses are no secret to baseball circles, the Braves books reveal that his investment in that club was a highly profitable one. In-gambling had resulted in the club being sold to Fuchs for \$35,000 in the club when he came to Boston 10 years ago and since then has collected more than \$300,000 as salary and expenses.

UPSETS IN N.B. TENNIS TOURNAMENT

(G.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) FREDERICTON, N. B., July 31—The semi-final stage of women's singles was reached today at the New Brunswick tennis tournament and finals in all events are expected to be concluded Saturday if fine weather continues.

In one outstanding match this afternoon Hubert Hawk, tireless junior from Orono, Me., gained a clean-cut victory in the third round of the men's singles over Bruce Hall, Toronto, Eastern Canadian junior champion. The latter uncovered a smooth driving game mixed with well timed lobs but the Maine youngster had the edge in steadiness.

Jack Babbitt, playing in his first tournament in this province since 1930, when he became Maritime champion, uncorked his old-time game against J. W. O'Hara, Ottawa, seeded second in the tournament, and the Fredericton player was leading from the picture set only to fade from the picture through lack of condition and tactics.

Isabel Matheson, Edmundston, defending ladies' singles champion, was forced to the limit by Jean O'Hanley, Moncton, but advanced to the semi-finals in a three set match. Mrs. F. V. Woodbury, Halifax veteran, who today defeated Louise Manney of Newcastle in straight sets. Mrs. J. F. Jones, Halifax, turned back Elsie Long, young Belmont star, "today's" Caulfield, Grand Bay, 6-0, 6-1, in a match marked by many deceits games.

Ross Wilson and Alan Eaton, Toronto, advanced in the men's doubles with a victory over D. E. Keating and Don Robinson of Moncton in two sets filled with brilliant tennis.

In one of the best mixed doubles exhibitions of the day, Hawk and Jean Dickie, Campbellton, and later they took the court to win from J. Louis McKenna of West Passy and Helen Leonard, Grand Bay.
