GOOD NEWS FROM THE FRONT.

Yesterday the long suspense as to Gen. Buller's movements was relieved by the news that a portion of his force had successfully crossed the Tugela River at Potgieter's Drift, while Gen. Warren had also crossed the river five miles further west. These movements were effected on Tuesday and Wednesday last, Potgieter's ford being crossed with little opposition by Gen. Lyttleton on Tuesday, while Gen. Warren, who met with stiff opposition forced his way across the more western ford on the following day.

The general line of advance has been from the British head-quarters at Frere, about 14 miles south of Colenso. From Frere a wagon road leads in a northwesterly direction to Springfield, which is a village of a few houses situated just north of the little Tugela River. From Springfield two roads lead northwardly to two crossings of the main River Tugela. The shorter of these two roads and the one least travelled leads to Potgieter's Drift, or ford where Gen. Buller's force is reported. The longer, but better road leads to the western ford by which Gen. Warren crossed. The two fords appear by the map to be about five miles apart, but between them the river is very crooked and bends far to the north so that the distance by the river between the two fords would be probably ten miles.

Gen. Buller is now about 16 miles from Ladysmith by the nearest road, and Gen. Warren some miles more distant. A long sharp bend of the river extends northward between the two British forces so that they must move forward at least five miles before they can possibly effect a junction. For that distance each must fight his way northward separately. By the passage of the river one great obstacle has been overcome, but hard fighting may yet be expected before Ladysmith is relieved.

ELECTORAL BRIBERY.

The other day in the Province of Ontario a witness in an election trial gave testimony unblushingly that he had paid out twelve hundred dollars for the purchase of votes. This man had once been a member of the House of Commons. One of the counsel, referring to this testimony, spoke of it as "candid," upon which Judge Osler remarked, "I should not call Mr. Smith's testimony candid. I should call it brazen."

Some eight or nine of the bribers and bribed were afterwards sentenced to fines of \$200 for each offence, coupled with disfranchisement for seven years. Within that time they cannot again vote or be appointed to office. This will be a wholesome lesson to these few out of many state criminals, who have long trafficked in the honor of the country. But it is only too apparent that the disease is deep-seated and wide spread. What has been done in the way of punishment in one Ontario constituency is loudly called for in a hundred constituencies throughout the Dominion.

The campaign fighting force of each of our great parties includes a bribery brigade, the doings of which in almost every election, if the truth were told ought to bring the blush of shame to the cheek of every honest elector. What seems to be required is an organization that will bring promptly to light the
