

THE STORY OF ACADIA.

The GUARDIAN is in receipt of "The Story of Acadia" written by James Stewart. The story is a double charm inasmuch as it is a tale of human interest and of human suffering. Acadia, which embraced the modern provinces of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, was indeed a land of romance, and the life of its people, and the life of the people of the present day. Here were reproduced, on a smaller scale, the conditions of life as they existed in France feudal times, and the Acadian peasant, cut off by a sea apart from the home of his fathers, developed a type of life in its simplicity, piety and devotion to his religious needs. Never was a people so beloved as Acadia was by the people of a great American poet, and the tears of many eyes. Yet the descendants of the exile of 1755 now number one hundred thousand persons on the land from which their fathers were expelled, so irresistible was the impulse which led them to return to their beloved land.

Although the march of civilization has brought some changes in the outward aspect of Acadia, it is still as beautiful as in the days when one unbroken forest covered hills and plains, and its great rivers flowed through a vast wilderness tenanted by the ruthless savage. MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY.

At Kensington and within the Presbyterian Church there, Thursday, May 31st, 1900, which time and place Presbytery met pursuant to adjournment and was constituted with prayer.

Sederent Mr. D. E. McLeod, moderator; Messrs. W. H. Smith, M. H. McIntosh, G. E. Robertson and J. M. Fisher, ministers; and Messrs. W. H. Brown and John Simpson, elders.

On motion J. M. Fisher was appointed clerk pro tempore.

Mr. Edwin Smith's Presbyterical Certificate was read and adopted.

The Edict of Induction was returned with certification that it had been read in Kensington and Long River churches on the two Sabbaths preceding and was read again to the assembled congregation.

Divine service was conducted by Messrs. Robertson and MacIntosh, the latter preaching from 1 Cor. 1:23 and 24.

The moderator then put the questions of the formula to Mr. Smith, the pastor elect and after prayer formally inducted him into the charge of the congregation of New London North and Kensington.

Mr. W. H. Smith addressed the newly inducted minister and Mr. J. M. Fisher the people.

Mr. Smith was introduced to the people by Mr. Fisher and Mr. Wm. Brown, and having signified his willingness to subscribe to the formula his name was ordered to be added to the roll of Presbytery.

The committee agent site of Cavendish church reported that they had visited the congregation and after investigation had advised a certain course of procedure, but finding a strong and unyielding opposition to that course the committee was not in a position to recommend any site to Presbytery for confirmation; but recommended that the whole matter be brought before Presbytery at a meeting to be held in the near future within the bounds of the congregation.

On motion the report was received and the committee thanked for their work, and after discussion the committee's recommendation was adopted.

It was agreed to meet in the hall at Cavendish on Tuesday the 12th day of June prox, at 2 o'clock p. m. Mr. Edwin Smith was asked to preach on that occasion, and Mr. McIntosh to notify all parties to be present. Presbytery adjourned to meet as per above arrangement.

The Churches Must Get More Together.

These are the days of consolidation in politics and business, and they ought also to be in some other things—church work, for instance. A trust that only gives a monopoly and higher prices to consumers is an evil, but a consolidation in any work for the benefit of the public, whereby greater efficiency is secured and better results attained, is to be recommended. The work of the Protestant churches in Canada could, we believe, be greatly advanced by a consolidation. The Methodist and Presbyterian, the Baptist, the Congregationalists, as one body, could do three times the work they are now doing, with half the men, half the churches and less expense, and leave a much larger sum of money and human energy for the mission field. And so with the college projects of these denominations. One college alongside of a national university would turn out all the preachers required, and these could be better equipped. There is a business side to church work as well as to other things, and church workers ought to realize it. The devil is still going about and as he goes about he considers the waste of energy, of which these churches are guilty, an engine always at work in his favor.

ELECTRIC CLOCKS.

Wireless Wave System Applied to Time-pieces.

At the Royal Society annual conversation at Burlington House, says the London Daily Mail, a large and distinguished company assembled to view an interesting collection of scientific appliances and inventions. Of these perhaps the most remarkable is a clock controlled at a distance by wireless telegraphy of the Hertzian wave system. The great potentialities of the invention may be understood when it is explained that under the conditions which the exhibitor, Mr. Richard Kerr, F. G. S., proposes it would be possible for the whole of the clocks in London to be simultaneously adjusted by one clock to which the necessary contrivance had been attached. To render a clock sensitive to the influence of the wave system it would be necessary to affix a receiving instrument, with a coherer, an arrangement which might be extended not only to the public clocks, but to those of private residences. Then by means of a transmitter established at any point of the city, it would be possible to adjust every clock in the metropolis by the instantaneous pressure of a button.

In all the collection there is but one item which offers some relief to the profound seriousness of the surroundings. It is a phonograph "record" of a Dyak song, the unspeakable weirdness of which almost breaks up the instrument.

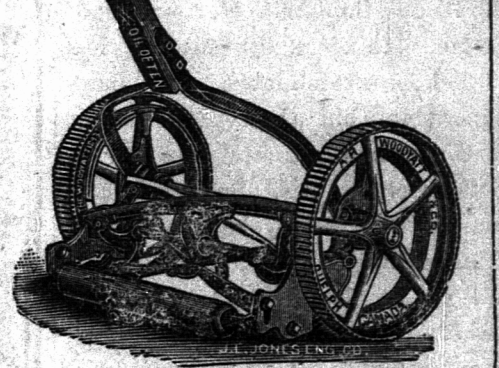
