USE OF PHOSPHORUS SMOKE SCREENS.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 28—The mysterious smoke with which British steamships have been provided to protect them against submarine attacks was seen here for the first time, recently. Two drums are attached to the afterdeck, one on each side of the ship. Each drum is filled with phosphorus. When the lookout sights a submarine an order is given to fire the phosphorus in the drums. Almost immediately heavy clouds of black smoke begin to pour from the phosphorus containers. The ship is entirely enveloped in the smoke and leaves such a long trail in its wake that the submarine cannot locate the fleeing merchantman. Five British vessels now in port are equipped with the "smokers."

L. P. U. Resolutions

At a special meeting of the L. P. U. held on February 28th the following resolutions were adopted:—Resolved, that in view of Premier Lloyd George announcing that owing to greater needs of tonnage for better defence of the Empire, there will be no ships to carry our Canadian canned lobsters to Britain.

If no lobsters are packed it will be a serious drawback for labor. Therefore, resolved, that the Minister of Labor be appealed to use his influence with the Imperial Government through the Premier, Sir R. L. Borden, in this great emergency to take over the twenty Norwegian steamers, built and building in Canadian yards of export to Norway, and that these ships be used to carry our Canadian lobsters, lumber, etc. to the British market. Further resolved, that a hearty vote of thanks be extended to Hon. D. Nicholson, M. P., for his able speech in Parliament, advocating Government bonuses of ship-building as Lloyd George says: "Victory depends on tonnage."

Be it further resolved, that copies of these resolutions be sent to the Hon. W. T. Crothers, Minister of Labor; Sir George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce; and to Right Honorable Sir Robert L. Borden; Canadian High Commissioner's office, London, Eng.; and Mr. Donald Nicholson, M. P.
